In her presentation on Polymeruse Chain Reaction (PCR) for Beginners, one of the workshop facilitators. Dr. Lovina Udob, described the process as "a common tool used in medical and biological research laboratories. PCR is also used in the early stages of processing DNA for sequencing detecting the presence and absence of a gene." Other topics covered included: Introductory Lectures on Genomics, DNA Extraction, Determination of DNA Concentration and Parity. Others are DNA dificution and PCR and Agarose Gel Electrophoresis.

Speaking shortly after handing over certificate of participation to the students, Acting Head of the Department of Microbiology, Dr. Chimezic Ogugbue, mended Professor Ataga for mounting the workshop He described the exercise as a collaborative programme between the Centre and the Department of Microbiology to expose final-year students to the use of equipment and techniques in Molecular Biology before their graduation from the University.
