Exenanies made his intention known in an intervice with a UniPost Weekly Correspondent on Tuesday, August 25, 2015.

Enenanjor, who was a former Head of the Department of Fine Arts and Design in the Faculty of Humanities. developed the award-winning Straw Art Design in 1983 a Lecturer in Graphic Design at the School of Technology, Kann. Based on the raying reviews he received, the Straw Actial further disclosed his intention to make a proposal to the Federal Ministry of Culture and Tourism on a blueprint aimed at boosting tourism in the country by exploiting the full potentials of the new art form.

"From my proposal, we shall obtain photographs of binaric dist from all the 7741 and Government Areas and iconic tourist attractions in the country, which would be packaged to promote the African culture and heritage to the rest of the world. These art works would be sold to Embassies, as well as being put on display at airports with the intention of boosting our image." he ed, adding that the straw art could also take the form of postcards for the decoration of homes, offices, as well as other public places to producte Niecelan art.

or Eneganjor, who designed the famous UniPort 2004 NUGA Games Moveer and Logo, divelosed that he was also planning an Arts Exhibition that would feature number of works collocied over the years, adding that the event would be in homour of some distinguished individuals who have shown immense love for art urks

Regretting that must art enthusiasts were usually put off by the high cost of acquiring articlacts for personal use, Professor Encuation advined such persons to fay more emphasis on the intrinsic value of art works, rather than the monetary value attached to them. for significant success to be achieved in the gas industry, Nigeria must give prominence to it and allow the market to drive gas prices A allow the market to arrive gas prizes while strengthening viciting regulatory inetitutiona. Additionally, all stakeholders should expedite action towards increased atilization of gas for power generation, fertilizer production and manufacture of petrochemicals.

These were some of the recommendations ma in at an International Conference on Gas, Petroleum Refining. Petrochemicals and Fertilizers, which took place at th Hotel Presidential, Part Harcourt, between August 19 and 20, 2015

Organised by the Centre for Gas, Refining and Petrochemicals (CGRP), Institute of Petroleum Studies, I niversity of Port Hursdaurt, in collaboration with the World Bank African Centre of Excellence, and Centre for Petroleum Research & Training, the Conference, which had "Maximizing Nigeria's Gas Value Chain through Partnerships and Capacity Building" as its theme, attracted the crime de la crime in the oil and gas sector from within and outside the country

Welcoming guests in the Conference, the Vice-Chancellur, Professor Ndows Lale, who spoke through the Deputy Vice-Chanceller in charge af Administration, Professor Anthony Ibc, expressed confidence that the auteome of the Conference deliberations would provide great impetus for sustainable development in the energy sector. Also speaking, the Chairman of CGRP Gaverning

Board and former Group Executive Director, Refining and Petrochemicals (R&P), Nigerian National Petroleum Corporation (NNPC), Eage Tory Oghnigwe,

uphasised the need to maximise Nigeria's gas value chain, which has strong linkages to industrial development, stressing that "true wealth for any nation is generated only by adding value to the natural renources eather than experiing them." In his contribution, Managing Director Chief

Excentive Officer of Nigeria Liquefied Natural Gas Limited (NLNG), Mr. Babs Omotowa, observed that "NLNG is one company that shows a good example of how effective partnership can add value and create wealth, while also building indigenous capacity."

Keynute Speakers at the Conference were2014 President of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers (AIChE), Mr. Ons Shelton and President of Frafis Energy Solution, USA, Dr. Soni Oyekan, who spoke on the topics "Chemical Engineers as Catalysts in Maximizing Nigeria's gas value chain' and "Bousting Nigeria's Economy via Gas Monetisation and Oil Refining,"respectively.

On his part, Director CGRP and Executive Conference Chairman, Professor Godwin Igwe, recommended that Nigeria must move away from whole crude export to revamp of exploration and production, of refining, gas and patruchemicals, which he described as great revenue-conners on a global scale. Igwa, who is also the NLNG Chair of Gas Processing Engineering in UniPort. noted that "Until we acquire what all industrialised nations have in common, that is, competences for manufacturing uncountable products, our country will remain underdeveloped. No one or nation is born with skills to produce. All knowledge, skills and competences are acquired through learning. A nation that hopes to manufacture many products must develop the people to manufacture them.

A communique issued at the end of the conference and

signed by Engr. Ogbuigwe and Professor Igwe abserved that "Nigeria's gas reserve (estimated at 198 trillion standard rubic feet), must of which is not harnessed, has a tremendous potential for industrial development (gas to power, gas to petrochemicals, and gas to fertilizer), which ultimately leads to economic growth and job creation. But sadly, revenue from screaming investment in gas is not reinvested in other areas of gas development" adding that "gas husiness in Nigerin is not given prominence in the country's budget formulation, which is bonchmarked on three speculative factors; crude all price, exchange rate and crude oil production rate without special consideration for gas in budget planning".

The communique, also observed that "Nigeria's conomy is still largely dependent on the sales of crude oil, which has a very low value when compared to refined products and therefore can do better when the country locuses on the expert of petroleum products and petrochemicals," recommending that " Nigeria's budget planning should not be based only on oil, but must clearly recognise the contribution of gas. Annual revenue contribution targets should be set by government on gas resources." It called on government to create an enabling environment for private sector investments in the gas and petrochemical business,

The Conference, which featured an intensive panel discussion lod by the MD/CEO, Foergia Limited, Foer-Felix Amieycolori, MD/CEO, Midwestern Oil & Gas, Engr. Charles Odita, and the Vice-Chancellor of Federal University, Otanke, Bayeba State, Professor Mobolali Aluko, harvested 23 technical napers with about 300 participants drawn from the industry, academia, government agencies, oil producing communities, civil society and the media in attendance. Former Special Adviser to the President on Petroleum Matters, Dr. Emmanuel Egbogah, the Acting Director-General, National Office for Technology Acquisition and Promotion (NOTAP), Dr. Dauazami Ibrahim Eugr. Babajide Soyode, Technical Consultant to the President/Chief Executive of Daugote Industries Ltd., Mr. Manish Singhvi, General Manager in charge of Strategic Planning, Dangole Oil Refining Com piny Ltd., Dr. L., Fatuna, Managing Directur, Siger Delta E&P Plc., Executive Secretary, NUC (represented by Mr. Bode Agagu, Group Hend of Prof. P. Exchanging views with a Correspondent of UniPort Workly on the award, Mrs. Akpodicts disclosed that the 2015/16 Schlumberger Foundation Faculty for the Future award for young Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics was highly competitive Schlumberger Foundation is a Non-Governmental Organisation (NGO) that also funds the doctoral studies women in STEM disciplines. Addressing a crowded Media Conference last Taesday, Chief Medical Director, Professor Aaron Olule, deenb commiscrated with the family of the decrased student. the University of Port Harcourt and the entire students, assuring the general public that a panel has been raised to thoroughly investigate ulready allogations of nogligency by schedule officers or the

circumstances surrounding this unfortunate incident is already being investigated and where any staff is found cutpable as is being alleged, adequate disciplinary measures would be applied according to extant civil service rules and professional codes of conduct," the CMD said.

Calling for restraint from all parties, particularly from students of the University, who staged a protest that disrupted normal activities at the hospital fast Monday, Professor Ojule stated that: "We have noted the iminuations and allegations of negligence leveled against our staff and the Hospital Management which may not be entirely true. We wish to state that we have standard operating procedures in all aspects of our work in the hospital and we would evaluate the events succounding this death against such standard operating procedures," regretting that threats to the lives of staff had led to untold suffering by those who partronise the survices of the boopital.

unacceptable to the University.

He told the delegation that Management of the University was doing everything possible to enthat such an incident did not occur again, adding that the authorities would engage in a comprehensive sensitization programme almed at updating students on the healthcare facilities available to them in the University and the Teaching Hospital.

Earlier, NANS Vice-President in charge of Special Duties, Mr. Ufnoma Erhantine, had appealed to the authorities to place matters concerning student welfare on the front burner to forestall reoccurrence of a similar incident.

Mr. Erharhine said that NANS received news of the unfortunate demise of Miss Ndulagwa with shock and total dishelief, stressing the need to pay adequate attention to the welfare of over 40 million students in tertiary institutions in Niveria. He described students

as the main reason universities were established in Nigeria, arging the authorities to create an enabling environment for them to achieve their full potentials as leaders of tomorrow. The NANS representative further disclosed that the delegation was in the University to obtain firsthand information over the circumstances surrounding the death of Miss Ndulagwa, noting that scentity and welfare of students were the primary responsibility of university authorities. He commended the authorities of the University for the proactive steps so far taken to address the situation, adding that there was an urrent need to draw the attention of bloker authorities to investigate the student's death.

Meanwhile authorities of the University have conduled with the family of late Kelechi Ndulagwa, A letter addressed to Chief C.E. Ndulagya and signed by the Registrar, Mrs. Matilda Noodim, read in part: We received with great shock and grief the sad news
