system is characterized by chronic undertunding, bad leadership, infrastructural decay, poor conditions of learning and service, promotion of mediocirty, shortage of personnel and entreachment of orthodoxy, parcohialism and chauvisins. In view of these, the Summit resolved to produce a Charter on liberating education that will reflect the aspirations, culture, values and realities of the Nigerian people within the context of a dynamic world.

The Charter would be based on a philosophy of celucation geared towards public good, national development and equity in place of the existing policy which promotes self-curichment and personal aggrandizement. It also rejected the on-sonal aggrandizement privatization of education and selling off of public educational institutions, nonling that education is a public good and should not be left in the hands of private individuals who are driven solely by profit motives.

body and removal of the waste products of metabolism from these same tissues to the organs of excretion mainly the kidneys and the lungs from where they are removed

from the body."

Dapper, who is a Blood Physiologist, submitted that the functions of blood can generally be divided into three tunctions of blood can generally be divided into three parts, namely: protective, regulatory and transportation, stressing the importance of intake of abalanced diet to ensure that the blood is able to optimally perform its functions. He also advocated optimally perform its functions. He also advocated the product of the produ

as panaceas to a healthy lifestyle. "Monitor your blood pressure, weight, and Body Mass Index regularly and make out time to rest and engage in leisure activities," he advised the public. "The bulk of my research over the years have been on blood physicaloge; though my research activities have

blood physiology; though my research activities have spanned many areas in the physiological and medical sciences," Dapper disclosed, citing a research he carried out with other scholars to determine the effects of cigarette on some haemorheological parameters in apparently healthy Nigerian smokers.
"Our results showed that smokers have higher values of haematocrit, whole blood relative viscosity and

haematocrit, whole blood relative viscosity and significantly higher values of crythrocyte sedimentation rate of non-smokers, confirming suggestions that combined effects of these changes were enhanced susceptibility to intravascular thrombosis due to possible enhancement of coagulation with higher cardiovascular risk to Nigerian smokers," he explained. As a way of encouraging scholarship and research in Human Physiology, Dapper, who was a one-time Dean of the Faculty of Basic Medical Sciences, called for the establishment of a Centre for Blood Research in the University to tackle the many blood-related ailments that bedevil Nigerians today. He also recommended the introduction of a Postdoctoral scheme for junior academics in the University to assist them further master the requisite skills required in the field of Blood Physiology, announcing the endowment of the William Davenport Memorial Prize for Best Graduating Student

in Human Physiology.
