JAMB, UNIPORT To Partner On CBT in 2013

n a bid to give credibility to the Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME), the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB), has disclosed plans to formally commence Computer Based Testing (CBT) in conducting the examination in 2013.

JAMB Registrar, Professor Dibu Ojerinde, who led a delegation of senior management officers on a courtesy visit to the Vice-Chancellor, last Monday at the Governing Council Chambers, University Park, listed prompt delivery of raw scores, elimination of cases of incomplete results and result black out and checking of examination malpractices as benefits of the CBT. He noted that candidates also have the options of Paper Pencil Test (PPT) and Dual—Computer and Paper Based Test (DPT).

Soliciting the support of the University in the use of facilities, Professor Ojerinde, called for collaborative efforts in enlightening stakeholders on the CBT, which he said would replace the other options by 2015. "About 76 per cent of the populace are looking

forward to the CBT option, we know that the University is already doing a lot in the area of CBT and e-testing examinations, so we have come to partner you in that regard", he added.

Receiving the delegation, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, commended JAMB for the laudable innovations introduced in the conduct of public examinations, expressing delight that the CBT would further give credence to the UTME. "The University is already conducting CBT examinations, I am confident that JAMB will scale through the exercise successfully", he said.

"We will give the necessary support to actualize this project because it is a step in the right direction to revamp the educational sector. Let me congratulate you for taking public examination to a higher level", the Vice-Chancellor stated.

Responding on behalf of JAMB, Director of Test Development, Mrs Agatha Bosini, commended the University for expressing willingness to partner JAMB in the CBT project, describing it as an effort to build both the Nigerian child and the nation.

Research Ethics Committee, University Of Port Harcourt

o doubt, the main business of any University, the world over is teaching and research. Many breakthroughs in the world today, be it in science, arts, agriculture, social sciences, etc are results of the effort of researchers. However, it is important to note that there are "Research Ethies" which must be followed or adhered to in carrying out research. These standards are established to guarantee best practices in any research endeavour. What will readily come to mind as readers go through this article are the following questions: Have we not been engaging in research in this University before now? Do we not know that there are standards? Do students not have supervisors who guide them in their research? The answers to these questions are in the

But that is not where we are going to. In any organized society, order and coordination is very important. The vision of the current leadership of the University in setting up the Research Ethics Committee is to ensure that there is a structure that would coordinate research activities. The Research Ethics Committee was established for this purpose. Its Terms of Reference are:

affirmative.

a. To maintain ethical standards in scientific investigations involving people

 To promote the dignity, rights and safety of the individuals so involved

c. To review all proposals for planned investigations involving people

To ensure that the proposed study is scientifically valid and justifiable and the benefits outweigh any risk of inconvenience or harm.

e. To take adequate steps to prevent physical and psychological harm

To maintain privacy by ensuring confidentiality of all personal and medical information and

g. To obtain consent without any form of duress.

There is no better time to put our house in order than this time when the vision of the present administration led by Professor Joseph Ajienka is to transform the Institution to an Entrepreneurial University, where the academia is encouraged to collaborate with industry for the mutual benefit of both. Deans of Faculties, School of Graduate Studies, Provost, College of Health Sciences and Heads of Department are once again advised to ensure that research proposals in their various offices pass through the Committee for approval.

It is hoped that the establishment of this Committee would ensure that research efforts are coordinated and the quality of research improved to meet international best practices.



Microbiologist Advocates Mushroom Consumption

speaking with UNIPORT Weekly last Monday in his office, stating that "Mushrooms, when consumed have the tendency to provide vitamins which is a good source of the B-Vitamins; it also helps in relieving depression, blood pressure, heart attack, stroke, stress and anxiety."

According to him, mushrooms also contain sufficient amount of potassium and provides selenium, which is an oxidant that helps to neutralize free radicals that could harm the cells in the body. He, however, stressed the need for people to consume and cultivate only edible mushrooms to avoid the dangers of eating poisonous ones that have been contaminated because of high scale of environmental degradation within the Niger Delta region.

Stanley, who pointed out that mushrooms are a nontimber forest products, which are often found as saprophytes on soil, open fields, farmlands wood and roadsides, said that the fruiting bodies are large enough to be visible to the eyes.

"I became interested in Mushrooms research because the food value is considerably high, since it provides people with additional vegetable of high quality and enriches the diet with high quality protein, minerals and vitamin which could be of direct benefit to the human health and fitness," Stanley stated, adding that when mushroom is prepared, it could be used for soup, stew, balls, omelette, pizza and salad.

He noted that he is currently collaborating with some Lecturers in the Faculty including Professor Eunice Nwachukwu and Drs Philip Okerentugba and Ngozi Odu.

"I am currently working with Professor Onyewuchi Akaranta in the area of research in Mushroom Science which has to

do with the chemical composition of mushroom and how humanity can benefit and with Professor Bosa Okoli, we are looking at the Management of Spent Mushroom Substrate (SMS) which deals with how waste collected from mushroom could be converted to into energy production. I am also doing other research work with some Lecturers," Stanley said, appealing to Management of the University to support the Biotechnology Centre with adequate fund to facilitate them more researches.

HOD Pledges Regular Training

A spart of efforts aimed at enhancing productivity and efficiency, the Department of Pure and Industrial Chemistry, last Wednesday, pledged continuous training and retraining of staff.

Acting Head of Department, Dr Leo Osuji, made the pledge at a 3-day Junior Laboratory Staff Orientation Workshop organized for newly-employed Laboratory Attendants and Assistants in the Department.

The Workshop which dwelt extensively on: "University regulations on staff conditions of service, Laboratory work ethics, Laboratory safety and simple measurements, Chemistry stress administration, Laboratory work routine, Introduction to laboratory apparatus and simple equipment and Preventative maintenance of laboratory equipment", according to Osuji, was put together to acquaint the new employees with their job description, as well as provide a platform for interaction between staff and management.

Osuji, who emphasized the importance of team work, advised participants to justify the confidence reposed on them. "This is not a typical government work characterized with laissez-faire attitude, work with your conscience and do your best to move the Department to great heights", he advised.

"This is the first in the series of training. We are anticipating that it would become a regular feature in the Department and it is hoped that all staff would benefit from the exercise which would come in phases", the Acting Head of Department said, adding that it would equip them with necessary skills to meet the demands of the job, in addition to enhancing efficient service-delivery.

One of the Resource Persons at the Workshop, Mr Okike Nwagbo who spoke on "Laboratory Regulations" warned participants against performing experiments without the use of personal safety and protective kits, knowledge of safety rules and procedures and application of same to laboratory work.

Medical Aid To Flood Victims

"We distributed relief materials and drugs worth about N500, 000. The drugs included anti-malaria and antibiotics for adults and children, antihypertensive, worm expellers, among others," Briggs-Otto told our correspondent, adding that the student body sourced the funds through donations from its patrons and the Vice-Chancellor. Professor Joseph Aijenka, whom, he said. lauded the students' efforts towards amelioration of the plight of the displaced persons.

Briggs-Otto, who noted that the Provost, College of Health Sciences (CHS), Professor Chris Akani, was also a major contributor to the outreach, said that Dean, Faculty of Clinical Sciences, Professor John Ikimalo, who accompanied the students during the outreach, provided invaluable financial and moral support.

According to him, Director, Institute of Maternal and Child Health, Professor Nwadiuto Akani, Dr Paul Nsirim of the Department of Paediatrics and Child Health, Dr Ngozi Orazulike of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology, two Registrars, two House Officers, 10 Nursing students led by Iheanyi Nwankwo, also joined the 71 medical students on the outreach, where they counseled parents, especially pregnant mothers and administered drugs

to children and adults.

Calling on other student organizations to emulate the humanitarian example of PUMDSA, Briggs-Otto, who is the representative of the CHS in the interim Student Union Executive Committee, appealed to public-spirited individuals and organizations to support PUMDSA in its bid to extend its medical outreach to other relief camps, where drugs and medical services are needed.

He disclosed that Nigerian Medical Association (NMA), Rivers State branch had in partnership with PUMDSA carried out medical outreach to Abua/Odual Local Government Area, adding that plans are on by the Association to replicate the medical outreach in relief camps in Ogba/Egbema/Ndoni LGA. The student leader, however, cited financial handicap as a major challenge standing between PUMDSA and its plan to provide medical aids to other flood victims in the State.

The medical team, UNIPORT Weekly gathered, was received by His Royal Highness, Eze Peter Ihua-Maduenyi, Eze Igbu Ehuda III, other chiefs and the Medical Officer in charge of the Floods in Ahoada-East LGA, all of who commended their efforts towards easing the pains of the displaced persons.

It would be recalled the authorities of the University of Port Harcourt distributed 1000 pieces of mattress to flood victims in Rivers and Bayelsa States a fortnight ago. Meanwhile efforts are being made by the University to acquire other relief materials including food items and toiletries for onward distribution to flood victims in the two States.

UNIPORT Turns Out 32 Pharmacists At Maiden Induction

total of 32 pioneer Pharmacists in the University of Port Harcourt have been inducted into the Pharmacists Council of Nigeria (PCN) at the maiden Induction Ceremony, which held at Ebitimi Banigo Auditorium, last Tuesday. The newly qualified Pharmacists comprising 11 graduates from the First Set and 21 in the Second were said to have met stringent conditions laid out by the regulatory body as prerequisite for entry into the profession in Nigeria.

In his address, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, who expressed joy for the triple achievements of not only inducting the pioneer students, but also securing provisional accreditations of the Pharmacists Council of Nigeria and National Universities Commission (NUC), recalled the tumultuous experience of the early years in the growth of the Faculty, expressing hope that the collaboration between the Faculty and Industry would expose graduates of the University to international best

practices in the field.

"The effort made in the acquisition of teaching and research facilities has placed the Faculty as one of the best in the country. I am particularly glad to announce that the Faculty of Pharmaceutical Sciences has also established a Drug Information Centre (DIC) that has linkages with the United Kingdom Medicine Information Centre (UKMIC), Drug Information Centre, Kenya; Uppsalla Monitoring Centre, Sweden; World Health Organisation Collaborating Centre on Pharmaceutical Policy and Access to Medicines, Utrecht, Netherland and World Health Organisation Pharmacovigilance Centre in Ghana, among others", the Vice-Chancellor said.

"We are gathered here to induct successful graduands, who have met all the stringent conditions specified by Senate of this University for the award of the Bachelor of Pharmacy Degree (B. Pharm), and Provisional Membership of the Pharmacists Council of Nigeria (MPCN). We are also here to bid them farewell after a successful sojourn as students of Unique UNIPORT".

Professor Ajienka said, praising the pioneer Dean, Professor Oleka Udeala, Professor Vincent Idemyor, members of Academic and Advisory boards, teaching and non-teaching staff of the Faculty, as well as parents and public-spirited individuals for contributing towards the growth of the emergent Faculty. He charged the Pharmacists to be worthy ambassadors of the University in their chosen career.

In her remarks, Acting Registrar of PCN, Mrs Gloria Abumere, who congratulated the 32 newly inducted Pharmacists, informed them that they would be required to undergo a 12-month Internship training to expose them to practical knowledge to complement the theories learnt during their academic programme.

"As you take the Pharmacists Oath today, you are beginning a journey that will lead you to great heights in your life. The brighter you shine, the larger your circle of influence in your chosen area of practice. Your potentials are unlimited so also must be your goals and aspirations. There is need to keep up to date in current international best practices as highly skilled professionals" the Acting Registrar, who was represented by Dr Paul Gar advised.

"Pharmacists have the obligation in ensuring the rational use of medicines and health commodities, as well as helping patients achieve and maintain good health by optimizing the use of prescribed medication. The Pharmacist is also the professional trained to communicate risks and benefits of drug therapy to both the healthcare providers and the lay public", Mrs Abumere pointed out, adding that pharmacists, is the responsible provision of drug therapy for the purpose of achieving definite and optimal outcomes that would improve or maintain a patient's quality of life.

Earlier in his address, Dean of the Faculty, Professor Udeala, who charged the inductees to adhere strictly to ethical provisions of regulatory agencies, said that total compliance to ethical practice would be part of the responsibilities they owe the University as good ambassadors, reminding them that Pharmacists, who indulge in unethical practices, risk being sanctioned.

UNIPORT Gets \$594,000 Grants For Software Installation

....PTDF Oil & Gas Research Grant Too

Research efforts made by Mr Nwonye Chukwunomso, a Lecturer in the Department of Mathematics and Statistics has yielded fruits, attracting a \$594,000 grant from SIMIO LLC, developers of SIMIO Computer Simulation software.

A statement signed by Mr Nwonye and made available UNIPORT Weekly last Monday, explained that the SIMIO grant provided the University with 300 copies of the SIMIO Academic Enterprise Edition worth US \$594,000 which will be installed in University computers in the various departmental computer laboratories and the Information Communication and Technology Centre (ICTC).

He pointed out that the SIMIO, which breaks down the walls of traditional simulation software, giving users the power to rapidly build accurate 3D animated models and objectively analyze alternatives to make informed decisions faster. According to him, SIMIO is designed as the first and only simulation software to combine the modelling speed of objects is with flexibility of processes, adding that it incorporates Optimization (Opt Quest) and Statistical analysis (StaFit) plugins.

"We are fast becoming a world where the use of 3D modelling and simulation is spreading into areas once only thought to be almost impossible. As University of Port Harcourt starts its new academic session, the SIMIO grant will allow us provide our staff and students with state-of-the-art simulation technology," Nwonye said.

He further stated that SIMIO Simulation software can be used in a number of departments, including but not limited to Mathematics, Statistics,

Operations Research, Computer Science, Physics, Mechanical Engineering, Industrial Engineering, Production Engineering, Electrical Engineering and Business Administration.

In a related development, Professor Ayoade Kuye of the Department of Chemical Engineering has received an award 2013 Annual Oil and Gas Research Grant of the Petroleum Technology Development Fund. This was conveyed in Memo signed by leader of the research group, Professor Kuye, stating that the award covered the sponsorship of a research titled: "Production of Bio-Oil from Lignocellulosic Biomass", adding that the sponsorship is for two years.

balance necessary for prolonged life on earth. He said that Convention on Biological Diversity had declared that at least 40 per cent of world's economy and 80 per cent of the needs of the poor are derived from biological resources.

"Genetic diversity plays a crucial role in the stability of our ecological system, and what we retrieve from it is priceless. Every species fulfills a role in the earth's biosphere and assures ecological survival. By self-regulation, biodiversity keeps the soil fertile, recycles all nutrients and cleans the air and water," Ndukwu explained, adding that many industrial and medicinal products exist because of biodiversity. "Because of its rich biodiversity, the tropical forest provides us with special medicines that can help overcome diseases. But most importantly, biodiversity provides food for humans," he pointed out.

Highlighting what he termed nature's incredible generosity, the Inaugural Lecturer, who emphasized that nature "not only provide physical, social and economic advantages, but also promotes total spiritual and psychological tranquility," said that "nature inputs and requires our greatest responsibility. We must understand the issues, the behaviour of biodiversity and subsequently collaborate with nature to ensure and insure our future survival.

"Nature hides several of the benefits of biodiversity in deep secrets. Part of our responsibilities is to discover these things and wisely exploit them for our advantages," the Professor of Plant Science and Biotechnology added.

Ndukwu explained that "biodiversity is a critical component of our natural resources; the totality of

all species of plants animals, microorganisms and the ecosystems and ecological processes which drives all natural systems." Citing the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development's definition of Biodiversity, he referred to it as "the variety and variability among the living organisms from all the terrestrial ecosystems, and the ecological complexes of which they are part, and that includes the diversity within the species between and of the ecosystem.'

According to him, the ecological complexes in which variety of life forms exist are the intricate and interdependent relationships that often occur among existing organisms, including the various processes that are going on continuously in the ecosystem, whether terrestrial or aquatic, "The diverse interconnected food chains and food webs create an ecological balance in nature. The loss of any one or more species may threaten the existing ecological balance of nature leading to a great direct or potential loss to humans," he pointed out.

On his contributions to knowledge, the Inaugural Lecturer disclosed that he had in collaboration with other colleagues, established chromosome numbers and characterization in some species of plants such Crassocephalum biafrae and Curucubita moschata. This, he said, is in addition to investigating the likely impacts of dredge spoils on the ecosystems of the mangrove of the Niger Delta. Citing other studies he carried out in various areas including, phytoextraction and phytoremediation, phytomedicine and medicinal value, rehabilitation of impacted mangrove species, Ndukwu disclosed that knowledge from such studies have been useful in sustainable management and conservation of the mangrove, especially, the rehabilitation of petroleum-related impacts. "We have also documented wide range of medicinal plants for various geopolitical zones of Nigeria as part of the efforts at embedding this sector in our healthcare delivery system," he said.

"We have been involved in the re-vegetation and remediation of thousands of hectares and kilometers of sites impacted by oil and gas exploration and exploitation in various locations across the Niger Delta. We have also trained many young people in the region on essential steps for raising mangrove seedlings and transplanting onto impacted sites for restoration," Ndukwu added.

In his remarks, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, who observed that the Department of Plant Science and Biotechnology had the highest number of professors in the University, said that the 96" Inaugural Lecture was the 6" to come from the Lecturers on ground and the 8th to come from the Department since inception.

Speaking through the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Administration), Professor Ethelbert Nduka, the Vice-Chancellor, who described the Inaugural Lecturer as a sound scientist, also commended Professor Bosa Okoli for producing a very sound academic in person of Professor Ndukwu, whom supervised right from his undergraduate days to his doctoral dissertation.

Congratulating the Inaugural Lecturer, for a well delivered Lecture, he said: "one thing that I find interesting about Professor Ndukwu is when he said that he personally chose to study Botany, not because he failed to secure admission elsewhere, I have come to realize that success is an integer of attitude, ability and aptitude and he integrated these three qualities," he said, stressing the need for people, who wish to succeed in their career to imbibe those qualities.
