The event which was the first in the series by the University of Port Harcourt aimed at immortalizing Lawson's musical exploits had the surviving members of the Band, ace trumpeter King Sunny Brown and intrepid conga player, 84-year old Chief Anthony Odili, doing what they had been doing

in the last 64 years, as their craft lured guests to the dance at the expansive Convocation Arena, venue of the concert.

In this spreading apocalyptic terror, very few saintly figures can be identified in the land, where corruption has become a first choice destination to unexplained wealth by ex-paupers.

The hypocritical self-righteous rhetoric of professional politicians on how to curb corruption was recently given a huge knock by the exemplary conduct of a lowly Cleaner in the University of Port Harcourt, Mr Godson Wachukwu. The Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka and Registrar, Mrs Matilda Nnodim, could barely contain the excitement roused in them by that rare moment of nobility and absolute integrity exhibited by Mr Wachukwu, who detected something that did not add up in his monthly salary schedule and uncharacteristically alerted the Bursary Department over the anomaly.

Mr Wachukwu did not relapse into any anxiety of moral choice when he objected to being paid far more than he thought he deserved as a Cleaner in the Campus Environmental Beautification and Sanitation (CEBAS) Unit. He not only reported the matter to the Payroll Officer in the Bursary Department; this man of integrity made repeated attempts to see the Registrar on the matter! In a country where some citizens have cultivated a life of obsessive preoccupation with rapacious living that is marked by embarrassing moral decline, Mr Wachukwu's example is a breath of fresh air in the New Year that calls all of us to a new level of restraint in our personal and official conduct. ur Intern, JULIET NNAMDI had a chat with Jonathan Egelibe, a Final Year Student in the Department of Medicine and Surgery, College of Health Sciences on his world as a student of the University. He discloses his passion for the teaching profession and how he hopes to combine evangelism with lecturing to render service to God and humanity. Read on:

UNIPORT was not really my first choice; I had wanted to go to the University of Benin for my Bachelor of Medicine and Surgery degree, not knowing that I was called to be part of a globally reputable institution. I gained admission through the Basic Studies programme. I did not write the Post-Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination for University of Benin, because it coincided with my Basic Studies examination. I got two admission opportunities in the Departments of Medicine and Surgery and Pharmacy & Pharmaceutical Technology. I had the best result in the Basic Studies programme and was offered admission to study Medicine," he recalled.

Egelibe's passion in studying about human life did not start today. He had been doing well in Science subjects right from his days in Secondary School, which earned him the honour of Biology Prefect and Best Student in Biology, His passion to save lives was also influenced by his choice of Medicine.

On his study habit, he said his discipline is quite demanding, so he is seriously in love with his books. He occasionally uses the Donald Ekong Library, because he found out that his colleagues are regular users of facilities there. He would not want to be nicknamed Jackichan as students always refer to those that study much. "I frequently make use of the Permanent Site Library (PS Library) and sometimes University of Port Harcourt Teaching Hospital (UPTH) Medical Library. Towards exams, my reading habit becomes more intense. I tend to cover more topics as # there is high level of assimilation. I also read at night during examinations," he said.

"I am computer literate and own my personal computer. I frequently have to

browse the Internet to source materials to enhance my reading skills, at least, four times a week," Egelibe said, pointing out that though he uses a Blackberry phone, which is the craze amongst students, but he is not enslaved to it. "Despite the advantages in the use of social networks, I discipline myself in doing the right thing at the right time."

He is known for his corporate wears, which makes some of his friend refer to him as Pastor. "I am a member of some social organizations such as Port Harcourt University Medical and Dental Students' Association (PUMDSA) and Adventist Medical Evangelical Network (AMEN)," he disclosed further, describing Dr Chituru Orlunwene as his favourite Lecturer and

UNIPORT Donates Mattresses To NDU

Speaking at the Senate Chambers of NDU penultimate Friday, Dean, Student Affairs of the University of Port Harcourt, Professor Henry Bell-Gam, disclosed that the donation was part of efforts aimed at bringing succour to the Institution, which was also affected by the flood, as well as fulfilling the community service component of the core mandate of the University which is teaching, research and community service.

"The Vice-Chancellor of University of Port Harcourt, Professor Joseph Ajienka, had utilized the activities of the community service component of the University to authorize the delivery of relief materials to flood victims in Rivers and Bayelsa States last year. We are here to ensure that this sister University benefits directly from the gesture," Professor Bell-Gam said, assuring the Institution of the readiness of University of Port Harcourt to partner it on research, particularly on the recent natural disaster, just as it has been doing in the area of teaching for the overall institutional growth of Niger Delta University and the region. Responding, the Acting Vice-Chancellor of NDU,

Professor Humphrey Ogoni, who commended the University of Port Harcourt for being the first to

come to the aid of his institution, explained that the

items came at the appropriate time when Management was refurbishing the hostels for students, disclosing that most of the mattresses in the hostels were destroyed by the flood, thus necessitating replacement.

"We are grateful for your intervention. It is a great relief to us because some of our mattresses were affected by the flood. This relationship is more than what we are seeing now, it will continue even in research and other areas of academics," Professor Ogoni said, soliciting partnership on further causes and extent of damage done by the flood with a view to forestalling future incidents.

IARD To Commence Certificate Programme

he Institute of Agricultural Research and Development (IARD), has disclosed plans to establish Certificate Programme in the Institute to support ongoing academic work in the Faculty of Agriculture. The Programme is expected to run for a year and four months, respectively.

Acting Director of the Institute, Dr Etela Ibisime, made the disclosure in a chat with UNIPORT Weekly, last Monday, stating that the Institute has been undergoing re-organization to attain better operational efficiency following establishment of the Faculty of Agriculture in 2005.

"The Institute is working hard to key into the vision of the present administration to be a worldclass institute, where Agricultural activities such as fisheries, forestry research, training and development are conducted in a sustainable manner based on best global practices", he said.

According to the Acting Director, with the

approval of Management, the Institute has applied to join the Africa Network for Agro-forestry and Natural Resources Education (ANAFE) to reposition the the Faculty to Institute and enable them carry out their core mandates of teaching, training, research and agripreneurs hip in all aspects of agric ulture in a

holistic manner.

On current happenings in the Institute, the onetime Acting Head, Department of Animal Science and Fisheries, disclosed that the Institute is currently developing a proposal on plantain production and utilization of elite local varieties that would be directly beneficial to farmers in the surrounding communities and the Niger Delta Region at large. He stated that the proposal is being developed in partnership with farmers cooperatives in Emohua Local Government Area in its pilot stage.

"We are initiating a process for collaborative research with the International Institute of Tropical Agriculture (IITA), in Ibadan, Nigeria on Plantain/Banana breeding. The Institute is also developing other proposals on the utilization of Spent Mushroom Substrate (SMS) as feed for ruminants such as goats and sheep," he said, adding that the Institute is also working on other proposals such as the conservation and the sustainable use of honey and the economic evaluation on climate change and its effects on small holder farmers in the Niger Delta and beyond.

Dr Ibisime said the breeding of plantain is developed by the Institute, while mushroom is developed in collaboration with staff of the Departments of Crop and Soil Science and Animal Science and Fisheries.

The Director expressed satisfaction with Management's encouragement of research in the University, stating that at the moment, Scientists in the Faculty are indicating interest to partner the Institute in the area of research. He further expressed gratitude to the former Acting Director of the institute, Professor Ebele Erondu who he said achieved some milestone while in office.


Egbogah Kick-Starts Expert -In-Residence Programme Today

Chi Ikoku Chair Committed To Local Content Dev

hair Occupant, Chi Ikoku Chair of Petroleum Engineering, Professor Dulu Appah, says the Chair would focus on capacity-building and capability enhancement, using the Industry as a platform as part of its mandate.

Briefing UNIPORT Weekly, last Tuesday, Professor Appah noted that the Chi Ikoku Chair is poised to drive Research in Petroleum Engineering in addition to utilizing human resources to proffer solutions to industry needs. "In this regard, the Chair would train manpower, develop capacity and assist students on a yearly basis with scholarships". He decried a trend where highly qualified personnel lack a befitting environment that would enable them give of their best to the system as is the case in other countries.

Disclosing that all is now set for the smooth take-off of the Chair, he noted that an office, lecture hall, laboratory space and equipment and a library, are already on ground, adding that Late Professor Chi Ikoku donated his entire teaching materials and literature to the Chair. "We would assemble a multi-disciplinary team drawn from Chemistry, Physics, Chemical Engineering and Biological Sciences, to tackle issues of formation damage control to enable us improve well production as part of our direct contribution to the petroleum industry".

Professor Appah, who observed that the Chair was

endowed to immortalize Professor Ikoku, said it was in recognition of his immense contributions to Petroleum Engineering education and profession. "He started the graduate programme in the Faculty of Engineering as Dean for 16 years. He trained the likes of the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, Director of the Institute of Petroleum Studies, Professor Mike Onyekonwu and the Shell-Aret Adam Chair Occupant in Petroleum Engineering, Professor Adewale Dosunmu, amongst others", he disclosed.

The former Manager, Planning, Research and Statistics in the Petroleum Development Trust Fund (PTDF) in charge of PTDF Chairs in Nigerian Universities, said he had experience in the establishment, challenges and operation of Chairs. "In the light of more discoveries of petroleum deposits in some African countries, this Chair would serve as a platform to develop capacity for the Gulf of Guinea. It is an opportunity to export human resources to assist universities and the industry in these emerging oil countries", Professor Appah said.

On the contributions of PTDF to local content development, he noted that the Fund has contributed significantly to the training of manpower for the petroleum industry, undertaken university advancement programmes and provided training to academics and professional bodies. "Academic staff of the Department of Petroleum and Gas Engineering benefitted from such trainings when I was in the PTDF"

On the contentious Petroleum Industry Bill (PIB) now pending before the National Assembly, Professor Appah stressed the need for quick passage of the Bill to domesticate the petroleum

adopted by the Dean in the administration of the Faculty since his assumption of office, promising to continue support for him to achieve the vision of the founding fathers of the pioneer Faculty.

Professor Ajienka, who observed that the Faculty was the first to inaugurate such an Elders' Council, advised other Faculties to emulate the novel initiative of the Faculty of Humanities, which he said consisted of seasoned academics and administrators, who not only engage in research and teaching, but also contribute their immense cumulative experiences towards the growth and development of the University. Professor Ajienka advised the Faculty members to continue to exhibit tolerance and understanding for one another to achieve the best for their students, whom he said were looking up to them for guidance.

"We should learn to be at peace with each other and be prepared to learn from the experiences of our colleagues as a means of improving ourselves. The reason we should listen to one another is because where you have intellectuals, divergent issues are bound to arise. Our capacity to understand each other's differences and ability to amicably resolve such differentiates us from the people outside the University environment. We should also show love to our students, because we may never know where we

will meet them in future. Students who are maltreated may never wish to associate with University whenever they are in privileged positions", he advised.

The Vice-Chancellor directed that any review of curriculum in the Departments must undergo due process before it should be presented before the Senate for consideration and approval. "No individual should be allowed to review the curriculum for a programme without considering the input of others in the Department. We must make sure that such proposed reviews undergo the right processes before they can become operational. These are very fundamental things we must pay attention to in our effort to standardize our course content and attain global best practices", he stated. Professor Ajienka informed the Elders' Council that construction work was proceeding apace on the Elechi Amadi Faculty of Humanities building, assuring the Faculty that when the project is completed, it would be one of the most impressive buildings on the University's skyline.

In his speech, Chairman of the Elders' Council, Professor N'olue Emenanjo, who described the Faculty as one of the oldest in the University, expressed happiness that positive change was coming to Faculty. He called on the Management to strengthen the academic staff to meet the imminent accreditation exercise and also reduce the heavy workload of academics in the Faculty.

The Vice-Chancellor later led the delegation to the construction site of the Faculty building, as well as the Department of Music. The Elechi Amadi complex for the Faculty of Humanities, which is sponsored by the Rivers State Government, is a storey building that would accommodate the various Departments in the Faculty.

Moretonhampstead, Devon, United Kingdom, late last vear. Speaking with UNIPORT Weekly, Peters, said that other participants, at the exhibition, included six professional

Ceramists drawn from different parts of the UK, and a German, adding that they were joined by an English medical doctor and Chinese engineer.

"We exhibited works that reflected our different cultures, specifically in ceramics. My works have to do with African techniques and shapes," Dr Peters said, adding that he produced most of the works exhibited there. He noted that the event afforded him an opportunity to visit other parts of the country to see arts exhibitions. "I was also invited to other exhibitions after the Moretonhampstead event," he noted.

On how he got to participate in the exhibition, Peters said: "There was an advertisement inviting artists from different parts of the world and I was fortunate to be among those accepted, thereby becoming the

second Nigerian to participate in the exhibition," disclosing that a UK-based Nigerian participated in the exhibition two years ago.

It would be recalled that Dr Peters did an exhibition at the National Gallery of Arts Abuja in 2011. At the exhibition, he showcased the use of available raw materials, especially clay in the production of ceramics, which could be used for electrical installations, rockets, comport chips, among others.

He advised youths to avail themselves of the abundant raw materials and the economic viability of ceramics to take up careers in the field, stating that it could provide jobs for many unemployed youths.

amous Russian dissident, Aleksandre Solzhenitsyn once wrote a thought-provoking book titled: The Cancer Ward. In that shattering book, Mr Solzhenitsyn declared: "There can be no greater affliction than for a doctor to suffer an affliction in his area of specialization". Late Eze (Professor) Edwin Nsitem Elechi, graphically fits into this description as he actually suffered a cerebrovascular accident on13th August, 2005 in the line of duty. As one of his anguished kinsmen and acolytes lamented in a moving tribute, "I now know that a saver of life cannot save his own life when the appointed time comes". How else do we explain a situational irony in which an accomplished Thoracic and Cardiovascular Surgeon gradually succumbed to an affliction in his area of expertise? He was not the first in this category.

Following a well-grounded foundational education in Nigeria between 1957 and 1964, young Edwin taught briefly in his Alma Mater, Western Ahoada County High School, before gaining admission into the premier University of Ibadan in 1965 to study Medicine. Even when the Nigerian Civil War interrupted his studies, Edwin temporarily

preoccupied himself with paramedical support services at the County Hospital, Elele as the drums of war roared in the distance.

Cut off in the emergent Republic of Biafra, the restless Medical Student and his three other UI peers disappeared through dangerous forest paths en route Ibadan in November, 1967 to continue their studies-a feat that prompted famous Playwright Elechi Amadi to write his intrepid play titled: "The Road to Ibadan" which celebrated their bizarre exploits through the swamps of the Niger Delta-just to obtain a degree. On graduation in 1970, the young Edwin became the first Medical Doctor in Ndele and second in the entire Ikwerre land.

It was during his Internship at Eku Baptist Hospital in Delta State that he had the privilege of certifying famous Highlife musical maestro Cardinal Rex Jim Lawson dead following a road accident. After a brief stint with the Rivers State Government between 1971 and 1972, the then Dr Elechi proceeded to Howard University in the United States, where he engaged in a straight Surgical Internship from 1972 to 1973; a

period that also saw him through the General Surgery Residency at Howard University Hospital between 1976 and 1977, after which he was appointed full-time Lecturer by the Howard Medical School.

Elechi became a Fellow in Thoracic and Cardiovascular Surgery at Wayne State University, Detroit, between 1978 and 1979. Not yet satisfied with his already intimidating medical credentials, the hunger for more knowledge took Dr Elechi to the famous University of Alberta in Canada, where he was appointed a Resident in Thoracic and Cardiovascular Surgery in 1979—the first black man to be trained in this rare field of medical specialization in that University! He became a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons of Canada (FRCSC) in Thoracic and Cardiovascular Surgery in 1982.

Elechi returned to Nigeria to join the services of the emergent Department of Medicine of the University of Port Harcourt as a Lecturer/Consultant in 1982. He rose through the ranks to become the first Ikwerre academic to be appointed Professor of Surgery and

Medicine in 1995 and held the Fellowship of many distinguished medical bodies in and outside Nigeria. He served both the University and Teaching Hospital in numerous capacities, including holding the position of Acting Provost of College of Health Sciences between 1995 and 1996 and Dean of the then School of Graduate Studies from then on to 1998. At his Inaugural Lecture, Professor Elechi told his audience that "There is no room for rehearsals in my theatre"-meaning that young doctors and support staff must come ready to perform surgery. He refused to relapse into the comfort zone of self-satisfied complacency. Elechi's recipe for success is that passion should purse excellence in everything a man sets his mind on. He was confident, consistent and enjoyed his work to the admiration of many.

Professor Elechi was not just addicted to the scalpel, stethoscope and lab coat; he lived an exemplary Christian life, rising to the hallowed rank of a Knight of the Anglican Communion. In fact, St Peter's Church, Omuofo, enjoyed his unlimited patronage until his painful death on 7th December, 2012-four weeks after celebrating his 70° birthday. In the traditional setting, Professor Elechi proved that Western education was not a barrier to a fulfilled communal life. He was installed the Eze Nwe Eli III of Omuofo in March, 1997. He was also a strong believer and contributor to numerous social causes in Ikwerre land, Rivers State and Nigeria.

Here was a thoroughly educated surgeon and intellectual, who still found a place for the dark, sometimes terrifying and apocalyptic cosmological world view of his people. He was at home with secular humanists, as he was with the scare tactics of fundamentalist messianic warriors, who preach a bizarre spiritual Darwinism on their crusade grounds.

Marcus Aurelius may have inadvertently summarized the life and times of Eze (Professor) Edwin Nsitem Elechi, when he wrote: "Let your delight and refreshment be to pass from one service to the community to another, with God ever in mind". A great man of many firsts indeed!

Ikoli Harcourt Whyte and Adams Fiberesima, were born in this part of the world. They had a mission to make people happy and they did it very well to popular acclaim". He commended the Department of Music and Professor Onyee Nwankpa for their efforts in promoting the image of the University through music within so short a period of coming into existence, revealing the intention of his administration to make the University a Centre of Excellence in indigenous music.

Also speaking, 5° Vice-Chancellor of the University and art enthusiast, Emeritus Professor Nimi Briggs, who lauded the innovation and creativity exhibited by late Rex Lawson in his playing days, said that it was such innovation for which a University should be known. He commended the Vice-Chancellor, for his abiding interest in promoting the Arts, despite his background as a Petroleum Engineer.

In their separate speeches, Registrar, Mrs Matilda Nnodim, Director, Institute of Education and former Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic), Professor Joseph Okoh, Chair Occupant, Harcourt Whyte Chair in Choral Music, Dr Kanu Achinevu, as well as Professor Omolara Ogundipe remembered with nostalgia the soothing effects of Rex Lawson's in the 1960s which cut across all ages grades, urging the younger generation of musicians and scholars to pay more attention to masters of the art, who had very little training in music, but still produced enduring works.

Earlier in his speech, Chairman of the event and Dean, Faculty of Humanities, Professor Ozo-mekuri Ndimele, who described the Faculty as the heart-beat of the University said that the late Cardinal Rex Jim Lawson was the hero of highlife music, whose peculiar style was widely accepted in Nigeria and beyond. He said, "Nothing

revolutionary has happened in highlife music beyond what Lawson and his talented colleagues did in those good old days. This shows that he will remain a legend and hero of highlife music".

In his welcome address, the Head, Department of Music, Professor Onyee Nwankpa, who said that "the gathering was not to re-visit the circumstances surrounding the untimely death of Rex Lawson, but to accentuate it and propagate it to our people, especially the Kalabari and Niger Delta people, that we Nigerians, remember, recognize, love and value our hero and legend, the king of highlife music, 42 years after his demise". Professor Nwankpa also disclosed plans to organize the Rex Lawson Garden City International Highlife Festival in July, 2013, calling on persons with information or artefacts on Rex Lawson to bring same to the attention of Department to enable it set up a befitting highlife

museum to celebrate his achievements.

In a chat with UNIPORT Weekly, King Sunny Brown described his late band leader as a comrade and friend, adding that his sudden death was a big blow to highlife music. The ace trumpeter regretted that a lot of people did not value Rex Lawson's music until after his demise in 1971. He said that although highlife music is still alive, radio and television stations no longer pay much attention to such genre of music in Nigeria, comparing it with Ghana, where highlife music is given quality air time. He disclosed his intention to establish the KSB Foundation for grooming young musicians in highlife music.

In his contribution, Chief Odili, who said that he had been playing the Konga for 64 years, said that Rex Lawson was a talented musician, who did not live long to make people happy through his abundant talent.

Ogoni Community Honours Konya As First Female Professor

s the first female Professor in Ogoni Ethnic Nationality and in appreciation of her numerous contributions towards the development of Kaani-Babbe Community in particular and Ogoni Kingdom in general, the Dum Me 1 Dum Association in conjunction with all segments of the Community, has honoured erudite Scholar and astute Administrator, Professor Roseline Konya for distinguishing herself in academics and bringing honour to the Community and Ogoni.

In his address at a Thanksgiving/ Reception held last December in the Community, President of the Association, Mr Ledee DeeBari, praised Professor Konya, who is currently Provost, College of Graduate Studies, for her numerous services to the Community, Rivers State, Nigeria and humanity.

"Dame Prof (Mrs) Roseline Konya is the first female Professor in Ogoni as a whole and the only Professor in Kaani Babbe Community as at today. She and her late husband, Mr Barido Konya, were able to use their goodwill to install electricity in Kaani Babbe. The only road network that traverses Kaani Babbe Community today could be traced to this family," the President disclosed, recalling that she constructed a 30,000 litre water project for the Community in 2008.

"She also instituted an Annual Football

Tournament for youths in Babbe District in Ogoni land. During a colourful and memorial service organized in her husband's memory in Kaani Babbe, a new church building for the Methodist Church of Nigeria stands out today as part of her community development efforts," Mr DeeBari noted, recalling that Professor Konya headed the Ogoni Negotiation Committee (ONC) that engaged Shell Petroleum Development Company in 1997 which brought about the much valued tarred road.

In her response, a visibly-delighted Professor Konya, who had declined earlier moves for the reception, thanked the Community for the honour, pledging to continue to do her best for the services of God and humanity. It would be recalled that Professor Konya, who was former Commissioner of Environment and Commerce and Industry in Rivers State, was elevated to the professoriate with effect from 8th December, 2003. She was also the first and only female Chairman of the Civil Service Commission in Rivers State.

Highpoint of the event was the presentation of a merit award for her pioneering leadership role in the development of Kaani-Babbe Community and academic excellence, provision of a lamp, signifying light in the Community, a hoe for farming, calabash full of water and other items to the honoree, who had also earned over 50 awards and prizes to show for her sustained commitment to community and human capacity development.
