Monday, at the Governing Council Chambers. The Institute also received donations from some members of INRES Governing Board. Speaking at the event, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, said that the University was driving an entrepreneurial

vision which makes it imperative to forge closer ties with other bodies to achieve set objectives, stating that the University cannot grow without mutually-beneficial collaborations.

"The University can only grow on the basis of research. We must move from theorectical approach to practical application of technological innovations for development. We are willing and ready to work with you for the benefit of the oil and gas industry and the environment," the Vice-Chancellor stated. He commended the National Universities Commission (NUC) for introducing the Linkages with Expert in Academics in the Diaspora Scheme (LEADS), disclosing that as a result of the importance attached to crossfertilization of knowledge to meet global best practices, the Governing Council of the University has approved the Brain-Gain policy. Ajienka also thanked the NUC Distinguished Scholar in Diaspora, Professor Chidi Ibe, for his contributions not only in adding value to the intellectual capacity, but also deploying his network for the benefit of the University.

Health Education Dept Sensitizes UDSS Students On Hygiene

octoral Candidates in the Health Education and Promotion Unit, Department of Health Education and Human Kinetics in the Faculty of Education, embarked on an awareness campaign on hand hygiene practices with a visit to the University Demonstration Secondary School (UDSS), last Wednesday.

Speaking to UNIPORT Weekly after an interactive session with the students, Dr Mfrekemfon Inyang, who coordinated the one-day exercise, said the intervention programme with the objective of creating awareness on proper care for the hands to prevent disease transmission was an essential component of the course requirements for graduation.

"We want to impact on the immediate community, especially on the lives of the young ones because good health is very important in achieving bright prospect in life. Prevention is not only better than cure; it is also cheaper than treatment. Our focus is on hand hygiene. According to Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), hand washing is the single most effective means of preventing infection; it is more effective than vaccine and medicine intervention," Dr Inyang said, stressing the need for regular washing of hands for at least twenty seconds each time one touches an object, uses the toilet or before eating.

In his reaction, Principal of the School, Mr Ogechi Anele, who described the awareness exercise as commendable, said the visit was not only timely, but also appropriate given the ages of the target group and the epidemic of typhoid and malaria which are largely caused by unhygienic conditions. "On behalf of Management of the School, I appreciate the facilitator, Dr Inyang and the PhD Candidates for the very important exercise. Enlightenment programmes such as this should be regular," Mr Anele added.

Responding on behalf of the students, Head Boy, Elema Godspower and Hostel Prefect (Girls), Orji Precious, promised to put into regular practice what they were taught and remain hygicnic both in the hostels and at home, commending the guests for not only creating the awareness, but also providing some sanitary items to them. The Doctoral Candidates were Braimoh Bashiru, Akpan Ubong, Christy Chukumati, Ikemike Olaitari, Blessing Jonathan and Walker Doubrapade.


Drama Is A Veritable Tool For Better Society ~Azunwo, MA Student

Emenike Azunwo, a Master of Arts Student in the Department of Theatre Arts, is a budding scholar with a passion to make a positive impact on his society. This, he hopes to achieve through his chosen career-Dramaturgy. To Azunwo, who specialises on playwriting, drama remains a veritable weapon for fighting various ills in society. Azunwo, who spoke on his research interest, lets our Correspondent, HUMPHREY OGU, into his world. The report:

o many persons, drama is merely a source of entertainment. But to Emenike Azunwo, it is much more than that. He believes that drama is not only a tool for reorientation and social change, but also a weapon with which to fight social vices. It was for this reason, he chose to specialise in playwriting.

"Right from my undergraduate days, I have always been very passionate about writing, and so I chose to build my career around playwriting. My reason for going into writing was to correct societal ills, because most persons are actually silent about social vices," Azunwo disclosed, adding that most people hold those who fight against social ills in disdain.

"So far, I have about eight unpublished plays, including, Hubris, Apogee—The Academic Seat of Decision, Shame in his



entitled: "The Last Resort: a Drama of Victimisation in Nigerian Universities", supervised by Professor Julie Okoh, are all attempts to fight societal ills. If what I have written so far are published and staged, I believe that I would be able to change people's orientation and fight injustice and social ills," he said, listing Drs Francis Minima, Ben Ejiofor as his other academic mentors, beside his supervisor.

Azunwo noted that his Thesis, which aims to rid the Nigerian tertiary education system of various social ills and injustice against staff and students, recommended "a sanitized method of recruiting academic staff into the university system and a reorientation of staff and students in the universities to create a more humane atmosphere that would engender quality learning and development," stressing the need for good student-lecturer relationship.

Azunwo, who is currently a Graduate Assistant in the Department, where he teaches courses in playwriting, observed that writing could either stem from an inborn talent or acquired in classroom, citing foremost novelist and playwright, Dr Elechi Amadi as a born writer, who did not study creative writing.

"Those who are born writers could go into writing freely and write very well without necessarily going through writing classes, while those who are not so gifted, but have interest in it could acquire the skills in classrooms and possibly do better than those who are born writers. For me, I'm not a born writer, I only have interest in writing and went ahead to study it," he pointed out.

Regretting that despite the position of College of Graduate Studies on students, who stay beyond the stipulated duration of their programmes, most students have overstayed due to no fault of theirs, Azunwo said: "I and some of my colleagues, who were admitted in 2009, have completed our Thesis since February, 2011 and we have seen our results; I don't know why we are still on the programme up till now. This is June 2013; we are yet to present our Thesis.

"The Management of the College need to monitor the way graduate programmes are run in various Departments. It is very important to call for quarterly reports from the Departments and also open a desk for students to drop their complaints on challenges they are facing in their programmes," Azunwo advocated, adding that with regular interactions between Management of the College and students some of the challenges that lead to students' overstay on their programmes would be nipped in the bud.

Azunwo, who described Library as the heart of research, said he uses the Library regularly, stressing the need for the provision of more books and other materials to boost research, teaching and learning.

PJC-GWDS Commences Sale Of Application Forms

he Patience Jonathan Centre for Gender and Women Development Studies has announced sale of 2013/2014 admission forms for the Master of Arts and Postgraduate Diploma programmes in Gender and Women Development Studies.

A statement issued by the Director of the Centre, Professor Elizabeth Okeke, stated that the programmes are interdisciplinary in nature and focus on gender issues with a view to providing the required knowledge for achieving positive relationship for effective collaboration of human population in diverse environments.

Professor Okeke noted that the programme among other objectives would provide men and women with an in-depth engagement in the revitalization, transmission and continuous delivery of research-based information on gender equity and women development. "While the minimum duration for the MA or PGD Full-Time studies is twelve calendar months, the duration for the Part-Time is twenty-four calendar months", she said.

She further disclosed that interested candidates for the PGD should possess a minimum of Third Class degree or its equivalent with a CGPA of 1.5 points on a 5 point scale, while a minimum grade of merit at Postgraduate Diploma level in Gender and Women Development Studies would also be considered. "For admission into the MA programme, candidates must have a Second Class Honours, Lower Division in Gender and Women Development Studies or a degree in the Social Sciences, Humanities or Education from any recognized university," the Director added.

Professor Okeke stated that completed application forms attached with academic transcripts, two reference letters and other relevant documents should be forwarded to the Centre. "All interested applicants are advised to log on to www.uniport.edu.ng after payment of a non-refundable fee of N 20,500. Bank Payment Print-out enables prospective candidates to obtain the Application Form online or from the Office of the Director", she explained.

ODL Kick-Starts Online Programme

Dike, has unveiled plans by the
National Universities Commission (NUC) to
kick-start its online mode of programme
delivery.


Speaking with UNIPORT Weekly last Tuesday, Professor Dike disclosed that as part of NUC's policy, universities should adopt a dual mode of course-delivery system, which include face-to-face plus online delivery mode.

"There is only one uni-mode University in the country, the National Open University of Nigeria (NOUN), which is authorized by law to deliver courses online and NUC, an agency of the Federal Ministry of Education, is in the process of overseeing the establishment of seven dual mode universities in the country and has suspended admission to many outreach programmes until they convert to the dual mode model, University of Port Harcourt is among these seven dual mode institutions", the Director said, adding that "NUC also insists that the University begins on a small scale, develop course modules in one Department and learn from experiences instead of starting with the several Departments at once, so we started with the Department of Political and Administrative Studies".

On current happenings at the Centre, which is located along Abacha Road in Port Harcourt, the Director said they have been able to create an ODL course development team, course structure and template, as well as apportion spaces for servers, and learning support team. "We also have a space for a Virtual Library and ICT room; we are in the process of wiring the place, so that the equipment can now be installed," he disclosed.

Professor Dike noted that for a start, the level of teaching would focus on undergraduates, explaining that the mode of entry would be School Certificate with five credits. He envisaged that the programme will last between six and eight years, adding that when the programme fully takes off and becomes uni-mode, they would no longer rely on JAMB for admission.

The Director stated that the Centre is run in partnership with other organisations to achieve its objective. "Fidelity Bank Plc has agreed to set up the internet connectivity for us and provide us with some facilities. We are



also trying to go into partnership with an organisation called Park Associates E-Learning Group, we are drawing up an MoU and plans are on to negotiate with the University on this partnership".

He further disclosed that in the quest to adopt the dual mode instructional delivery model, University of Port Harcourt in 2012 set up the Open and Distance Learning Unit and became a platinum member of the African Virtual University (AVU), explaining that AVU is a Pan African intergovernmental organisation founded by African Development Bank with a mission to increase access to quality higher education and training through the innovative use of Information and Communication Technologies.

Professor Dike said the benefits of UNIPORT being a platinum member is that AVU will establish and equip an Open Distance e-Learning (ODel) Centre in UNIPORT, stating that in May 2013, AVU organised a curriculum Conceptualization and Harmonization workshop in Nairobi, Kenya in readiness for the implementation of Multinational project II. "The workshop compared the professional education and science curricula across the 27 participating institutions with a view to identifying similarities, gaps and harmonise these curricula. We developed new curriculum for Applied Computer Science after comparing computer science from other 27 participating institution," he disclosed.

ice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, has tasked the Rivers State Chapter of the Counselling Association of Nigeria (CASSON), to work with the Department of Sociology and College of Medicine to establish a Trauma Centre in the University to assist victims of kidnapping and rape.

Professor Ajienka, who thanked members of the Association for siting the Headquarters of the State Branch in the University when they paid him a courtesy visit last Wednesday, commended them for their human-oriented activities. "The Trauma Centre would enable victims and their families overcome the psychological and emotional trauma they face after such terrible encounters", he added.

Stressing the importance of guidance and counselling to the society, the Vice-Chancellor told the Association to consider collaboration with the Institute of Arts and Culture on a film documentary to educate newly-admitted students as well as propose a Career Fair in partnership with industry for the benefit of students.

In her address, the Chairperson of the Association, Dr Chinenye Awujo, commended the Vice-Chancellor for the developmental strides recorded so far in the University. "We also wish to commend you for giving counselling a pride of place in your University through the establishment of a Guidance and Counselling Unit in the Student Affairs Department," Awujo said, describing it as the first of its kind in any tertiary institution in the State.

Referring to the Association as a group of professional Guidance Counsellors with the mandate of facilitating counselling delivery to improve quality of life, the Chairperson said that the Association has successfully undertaken a one-day rehabilitation programme as post-flood assistance to victims of the disaster last year, organised radio and television talk shows to address societal challenges, amongst other activities. "We are equally ready to partner your institution in the areas of guidance and counselling, orientation and social reengineering", she said.

Member of the delegation, Professor Osita Nwankwo, who stressed the importance of the Trauma Centre to the University, noted that the Association would also assist the University counsel students in the areas of examination failure and values orientation.
