Enhancing Medical Values Of Buccholzia Coriacea

Buccholzia Coriacea, popularly known as 'wonderful kola', is a cure-all of sorts in trado-medical practice in Africa. What are the active ingredients of this plant? Victor Olua a Final Year Student in the Department of Biochemistry, Faculty of Chemical Sciences, College of Natural and Applied Sciences (CNAS), strives to answer that question in his research project. To achieve this feat, Olua, whose research project topic was: "Comparative Phytochemical Study of Various Local Formulation from Buccholzia Coriacea". said: "I came to understand

Medicine, Buccholzia Coriacea or wonderful kola as it is commonly known, cures a lot of diseases I decided to find out the active ingredients that make this ssible "I collected a

a fermented opium extract of it and distilled samples at various temperatures-100, 200 and 300 degrees Celsius, Having done that, I find out that different formulations actually affect the phytochemical component of the kola as the fermented samples shows a reduced level of phytochemicals, while the distilled samples contain varied phytochemicals. That is to say, one could use distillation to isolate some of the phytochemical components of the kola," he pointed out. Olua observed that the knowledge acquired from the research could be used to isolate antioxidants such as flavonoid, in the treatment of diseases, especially free radicals, which could accumulate as a result of consumption of junk food, adding that "the fermented sample can be used in the treatment of diseases such as arteriosclerosis and hypertension due to substantial level of phytostesterols, and that fermentation and distillation of the aqueous extracts of Buccholzia corieucea gave more of active ingredients than anti-

> He disclosed that the work has been presented at the 247th American Chemical Society national meeting, which is the largest Chemical Society in the world, and published on its website, commending his supervisor, Dr Eucharia Nwaichi for supervising, mentoring and

exposing him to the world of scholarship. "I cannot thank my supervisor enough for her input towards the success of my project. In the next ten years, I see myself leading a worlds research team as a

toxicologist in the areas of

environmental and medical biochemistry. My supervisor has already set a pace in that direction. I am

happy to be one of her students and supervisces," the upand-coming toxicologist stated, expressing gratitude to his lecturers, whose lectures made it possible for him to cope with his academics, while also engaging in extracurricular activities, especially student politics.

Professing his love for his chosen field of study, Olua noted: "I chose Biochemistry because of its versatile nature and would love to study the same course over and over again. I love to be called a Biochemist and so I would prefer to study the course anytime, any day," advising ounger colleagues to always remember that academics is their primary aim of being in the University,

On how he was able to combine his studies with student politics, Olua, who is the outgoing President of Nigerian Association of Science Students, describes politics as a game which he plays during the day, while tackling his academics at night, citing a favourite maxim of his as one of his guiding principle: "While men are asleep, great men are awake, while real great men are awake doing something

Lauds Human Kinetics

Professor Clement, who made the observation in a chat with UniPort Weekly shortly after assessing some Doctoral Candidates of the Department at the College of Graduate Studies (CGS) as External Examiner, expressed satisfaction with the quality of dissertations presented by Candidates, pointing out that both the courses in the Department and their research works were tailored towards solving societal problems.

"I have seen the level of development in this University and the Department of Human Kinetics and Health Education in particular, I am quite impressed with them because they are not static, but dynamic. Their courses proffer solutions to societal problems, especially in Health Education in the areas of Community Health, Occupation Health and Safety Education," Clement, who had also lectured in the University of Lagos, said.

"I am told that the Department plans to introduce Rehabilitation Health to the existing programmes. When you look at some of these areas vis-à-vis the mastery in presentation by

the Candidates, you would see that they are proffering solutions to problems, For instance, a student was looking at occupational health hazard of mortuary workers. Another one studied occupational health hazard in the cement factory, while the third one focused on solid waste disposal management. This makes the University of Port Harcourt different from other universities; you don't see people venturing into the areas UniPort is going right now," he added.

The Professor of Sports Management who also praised the College of Graduate Studies for introducing a number of innovations, however, advised the Department from which the research originated to organize conferences around them, stating that conferences on occupational health of

Anikpo Outlines Panacea To security Upsurge In Nigeria

away lot of idle minds who are ready tools for security scheme in which the unemployed would be entitled to some welfare package, no matter how small, advocated the need for political education of the citizenry, noting that a good political culture, particularly if imbibed by the youths, would go a long way in addressing the situation. Contrary to the popular notion held by many that poverty is a major reason for the new wave of insurgency in the North Eastern part of the country, Professor Anikpo said that the situation was rather political than economic. "I do not buy the idea that the reason for the insurgence is as a result of poverty. In many Nigerian villages, people are poor and they have not taken up arms to kill other people. The most

This is because one begins to wonder the link between the upsurge in insecurity and the 2015 general elections," he pointed out, adding that "it is curious that as we get closer to the elections, the insurgency is increasing."

The Director of the Centre for Ethnic and Conflict Studies in the University also said that it was not true that the cause of the problem is religious. "To say that the problem is religious is ridiculous, because the most recent occurrence is not only on the churches. Moslems, Christians and everybody are being killed. The implication of what is happening is that the capture of political power is the root of it all. If the situation continues, it will lead to loss of confidence by the people in the present administration. It may also lead to more violence or even the desire by the electorates to change the government in the next elections."

On the ongoing National Conference, the former Deputy Vice-Chancellors (Administration) said that the problem with Nigeria is not a matter of talk and therefore the National Conference does not have the capacity to address the myriad of problems facing the country.

"The National Conference is not the panacea to our problems because even after they have talked. it will take somebody to implement the decisions. It is at the point of implementation that the problem exists, he stated" stressing that "there is already a rigid system that propels people in a certain direction which if not altered the situation in the country will not change."

"Five partners were involved in the Agribusiness Enhance Project which was: our lead Institution, Egerton University in Kenya, University of Port Harcourt in Nigeria, Gulu University in Uganda, Makele University in Ethiopia and University of Copenhagen in Denmark, as a European associate partner. We also had other associate partners which include: Regional University's Forum for capacity building in Agriculture (RUFORUM) based in Uganda, Kenya National Federation for Agricultural Producers (KENFAP) and International Centre for Research oriented


