## Mgt Engages Student Leaders on Levies ... Dean Promises Mgt/Students Joint Committee

ollowing slight adjustment in the schedule of non-statutory levies, authorities of the University of Port Harcourt have assured students of their continued resolve to accommodate their interest when taking decisions on matters affecting them at all times.

Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, gave the assurance at the Council Chamber, last Monday during a stakeholders meeting with Student Union Executive and Faculty Representatives, who expressed concern

over the slight adjustments in municipal levies.

Professor Ajienka, who was represented by Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Administration), Professor Ethelbert Nduka, said that the slight adjustment in charges was to ensure that students had the best in terms of service delivery to enable them compete with their peers in other universities, adding that the administration was leading by example by operating an open door policy to ensure that students imbibed qualities that would prepare them to face future challenges. He assured them that the present administration will not deny them what is due them, pointing out that Management was welfare-oriented on matters affecting staff and students of the University.

The Vice-Chancellor told the student representatives that despite the financial challenges faced by the Institution, a lot was being put in place to ensure that the students had the best, stressing that the marginal adjustments in levies were based on the resolve of the administration to continue to provide services that would guarantee quality education for them. Said he," The charges are for the mutual benefit of everybody in the system. We are doing it so that the system does not collapse, especially in the post-subsidy removal era."

Professor Ajienka disclosed that the University spends between N30 and N40 million monthly on power supply and sanitation in order to ensure that students lived in a healthy environment that is

conducive for learning, appealing for understanding of the efforts of the administration to ensure that they had the best within limited resources.

In his speech, the Bursar, Mr. Mark Roman, said that the University was facing acute financial problems, disclosing that the Institution receives an annual allocation of between N52 to N60 million annually, while it spends over N120 million monthly to keep the University running, adding that the levies are used to sustain the University.

Also speaking, Acting Dean, Student Affairs, Dr. Matthew Wegwu, said that as part of measures to ensure accountability and probity a Management/ Students Joint Committee on Hostel Management would be set up, as well as a task force to ensure implementation of all that the authorities have proposed to improve life on Campus for students and staff.

Earlier in his remark, President of the Students' Union, Mr Rhino Owhokire, who thanked the authorities for their willingness to dialogue, stated that students felt uncomfortable with additional charges and resolved to seek clarification on the development, adding that they were not too sure of full implementation of some of the proposals to improve facilities for the end beneficiaries.

The meeting was attended by the Vice-President, Rachael Elijah, Secretary General, Chinedu Kingsley, Speaker, Maxwell Nyanabo, as well as representatives from the Faculties of Management Sciences, Basic Medical Sciences, Humanities, Social Sciences, Education, Engineering, Sciences and Pharmacy.



s part of efforts by authorities of the University to forge a symbiotic relationship between the Institution and the Industry in fostering research aimed at tackle developmental challenges facing the country, a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) has been signed with the Nigeria National Petroleum Corporation (NNPC) in bio-fuel research.

Speaking at the event, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, expressed hope that by signing the MOU, experts from the NNPC Research and Development Unit and the University would jointly deploy their expertise and facilities in the two Institutions to address the needs of the Corporation and the Oil and Gas Industry, including the International oil Companies (IOC) in such areas as Petroleum Geosciences, Oil and Gas Exploration and Production, Petroleum Refining and Petrochemical Technology, Offshore Technology, Renewable Energy and Sustainable Development.

Professor Ajicaka, who was represented by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor, (Research and Development), Professor



Bene Wille-Abbey, assured the NNPC that the skills, experience, knowledge and manpower developed from the collaborative effort would be tailored towards conducting a wholly Nigerian research in selected areas of need in the petroleum industry and also development of technologies and products from the joint effort.

In his address, Group Executive Director, Exploration

development of novel technologies for bio-fuel and production of 'green' and readily available fuels for the economic development of Nigeria. He hoped that the collaboration would breed some of Nigeria's best bio-fuel scientists that can introduce the product the marketplace. Also speaking, Group General Manager, Research and Development, Engineer Nelson Oyudo, said that signing of the MoU marked the beginning of serious commitment and cooperation between the two institutions with regards to establishment of the framework and principles under which the parties would collaborate to achieve the goals of the MoU, expressing hope that the collaboration would bring together the academia and industry research experts into a consortium of intellectual strength and expertise in bio-fuel research and development.

Facilitator of the collaboration, Dr. Samuel Ofodile, said that the emergent partnership would afford the two institutions a platform to utilize their resources to tackle the challenges that face the petroleum Industry.

Also speaking, pioneer Group General Manager Research and Development, Dr Eugene Ibe, who stated that the event was a dream come true, hoped that such collaboration would enhance capacity in the industry.

Present at the event were General Manager, Exploration and Production, Engineer Benjamin, Ogbaigbena, General Manager, Refining and Petrochemical, Engineer Basil Ezeaniekwe, Manager, Technical Services, Engineer Olufemi Adeyemi, Manager, Process and Catalysis, Dr. Obiora Okeke, amongst others.

### **UNIPORT Gets Grant For Natural Resources Institute** ...Partners Four Varsities To Deliver Project

f the 15 competitive proposals for grant submitted by Nigerian universities to the MacArthur Foundation, Chicago, last year, the one presented by the University of Port Harcourt for the establishment of an Institute of Natural Resources,

Environment and Sustainable Development (INRES) sailed through thereby, getting the approval and funding of the donor agency.

In a brief on the project obtained by UNIPORT Weekly, the Project Leader, Professor Enuvie Akpokodje, disclosed that the proposal was jointly written with Professor Ben Ndukwu and Dr Iyke Aghagwa, both of the Department of Plant Science Biotechnology, stating that its objective is to produce requisite indigenous manpower capable of developing and implementing an integrated, multidisciplinary, as well as sustainable solutions to developmental and environmental challenges across the West African sub-region with particular attention on the Niger Delta.

According to Professor Akpokodje, the proposed Institute would produce quality Master's degree graduates and enhance technical skills and managerial capacity of the workforce of both governmental and corporate organisations through specially-designed professional short-term courses to address identified knowledge or skill deficiencles.

"Coordination of all environment-related academic and research programmes in the University and therefore, a platform for quality cross-disciplinary and multidisciplinary training, capacity-building, collaborative applied research, networking and service in the area of sustainable development, resources and environmental management by pooling together experts from the various disciplines," are identified as part of the benefits to be derived from the Institute, he

INRES which would take an organizational structure similar to the Institute of Petroleum Studies (IPS) and coordinate Regional Centre for Bioresources, Centre for Biotechnology/Biofuel among other related centres, is unticipated to improve teaching and research capacities.

"INRES will train graduates in Natural Resources and Environmental Management at the Master's degree

level, with research project in the student's area of career interest or future specialization. Additional programmes at the Doctoral, Postgraduate Certificate and Diploma levels would be included later," Professor Akpokodje further disclosed, adding that such programmes would consist of intensive course work and project writing within 12 months on full-time study divided into nine months for course work and three months for field/case studies or project.

University of Gothenburg, Sweden, Niger Delta

University, Bayelsa State and Delta State University, Abraka, were listed in the three-year grant as partnering universities, while collaboration which would be anchored on relevance to the subject is expected to cover institution of higher learning both within and outside the country, government and community organisations, as well as the private sector.





s the Lassa Fever epidemic continues to claim lives in parts of Rivers State, the latest being the death of a Matron at the University of Port Harcourt Teaching Hospital (UPTH), a Rapid Response Team set up to tackle the Fever in the Hospital has ended a Workshop to sensitize health workers in the hospital on basic skills for proper handling of the virus to stem further casualties.

Speaking during the Workshop which took place at the UPTH Conference Room last Monday, Chief Medical Director, Professor Aaron Ojule, noted that "We got into a situation where it became difficult for us to attend to even ourselves. We had to appeal to the Federal Government which responded promptly. We also got across to the State Government which also has been very supportive. This is an emergency, an epidemic that threatens all of us. For us who are in the frontline, it is very important to know how to protect ourselves because we cannot completely run away from it."

Professor Ojule, disclosed that the Rapid Response Team would co-ordinate activities aimed at checking further spread of the epidemic. "The State Government has set up an Emergency Response Team with me as Chairman. Some funds have been made available, an emergency isolation ward created and Personal Protection Equipment (PPE) provided. We very prepared but our hope is that the epidemic will burn out quickly," he said, reassuring participants at the Workshop that "there is no cause for alarm; what is important is universal precaution for everybody that comes into this hospital. But you need to protect yourselves. That doesn't mean you should run away."

Also speaking, head of the Rapid Respond Team for Lassa Fever in the Hospital, Dr Charles Tobin-West, said the "the Workshop was informed by the fact that recently, we recorded a fatal case of Lassa Fever in the Hospital and we need to be proactive by raising our index of suspicion so that we won't lose our patients, as well as our healthcare workers, such as Doctors, Nurses, Laboratory Scientists, including Cleaners and Ward Maids. That is why we try to sensitize everybody to understand the problem at hand and how to tackle it."

## <u>Lassa Fever Outbreak</u> UPTH Team Sensitizes Health Workers

Preventive and Social Medicine, confirmed the death of a Chief Nursing Officer in the Hospital. According to him, a lot of health workers have been lost to this disease in other part of the country, promising that "the Team was working to ensure that no more deaths are recorded."

In her contribution, representative of the Rivers State Government, Dr Justina Jumbo, noted that "the objective of the Workshop is to sensitize health workers on the fact that Lassa Fever is here with us. Since its discovery in the North in 1969, this is the first time Rivers State is recording an occurrence. We are really working hard to tackle it. Apart from this programme, we are also carrying the sensitization campaign to various communities."

Presentations were also made by representatives of the Federal Ministry of Health, led by Lassa Fever Desk Officer and Epidemiologist, Mr Adebayo Duruajaye and Dr Oladayo Biya, who noted that the objectives of the Workshop were to sensitize Physicians and other health workers on how to identify, confirm and treat Lassa Fever, and some other priority diseases, increase the index of suspicion of these diseases and reduce morbidity/mortality as well as reinforce early warning systems for rapid detection and prompt response to their outbreak and acquaint clinicians and health workers of their roles in disease surveillance and control.

Other members of the Team which disclosed that Ribavirin drugs and PPE have been made available by the Ministry, included Mr Muftau Akinpelu and Mrs Funmi Badmus, while a Consultant Cardiologist at UPTH, Dr Eze Nwafor, gave an overview of the virus, dwelling on the signs, preventive measures and management of the killer-virus.

According to the various presentations made at the

event, Mastomy nutalensis is the species of rat that transmits the killer-virus. The virus is shed freely in urine, droppings and saliva; the rats may show no feature of the disease. Mastomys often lives in homes, while the virus is easily transmitted to humans. Transmission occurs via direct contact with rat urine, faeces, and saliva, contact with excretion or secretion infected materials, ingestion of excretion-contaminated food.

"Victims can also become infected via skin breaks, and mucous membranes from aerosol transmission from dust-borne particles. Laboratory workers become infected usually from contact with rodent saliva," the Team informed participants, advising that Patients should receive supportive care consisting of maintenance of appropriate fluid and electrolyte balance, oxygenation and blood pressure, as well as blood transfusion and treatment of any other complicating infections.

On preventive measures, the facilitators noted that trapping in and around homes can help reduce rodent populations, proper disposal of killed rats, putting food away in rodent-proof containers and keeping the home clean help to discourage rodents from entering homes. Avoidance of rat delicacies, keeping rodents away from warehouses and stores where canned and sachet drinks are kept, were also listed as ways of preventing primary transmission, while prevention of secondary transmission involves avoidance of overcrowding, universal precaution in handling of patients and specimens.

Major signs of the disease, according to the various Speakers, include bleeding from body orifices (mouth, nose, rectum, urethra, and vagina), swollen neck or face, conjunctivitis or sub conjunctival haemorrhage, spontaneous abortion, petechial rash and haemorrhage, persistent hypertension, while minor signs comprise headache, sore throat, vomiting, chest or retrosternal pain, cough, and diarrhoea, amongst others.

Meanwhile, a Paper entitled "Lassa Virus Infection in Nigeria: Clinical Perspective Overview", published in the Journal of the National Medical Association in December 2010, by one of the facilitators and Visiting Scholar, Professor Vincent Idemyor of the University of Illinois College of Medicine, Chicago, Ulinois, USA, was cited as a prophetic scholarly contribution on Lassa Fever.

The Workshop which featured demonstrations on how to use PPE, had in attendance Consultants, Resident Doctor, Nurses and other categories of healthcare workers, including students of medicine and allied disciplines.

## **Legends And Their Legacies**

ne of the most effective ways in which leaders exhibit their qualities and gain acceptance from their followers is to demonstrate exemplary qualities in their daily actions. As academic, administrative and community leaders, the late Professors Claude Nkparom Ejituwu and Abiye Atenie Obuoforibo, were great intellectual giants who truly entered the environments of their subordinates and established frequent human contacts. They practised a leadership style that easily generated trust from those who came into contact with them in public service and private life. Very sedate and focused in their lifestyles—one as a distinguished Historian and the other—a consummate Medical Practitioner and Anatomist, they had a knack to listen far more than they talked, despite possessing a

tremendous burst of energy and activity. They had kind words and encouraging smiles and humorous complements for those who crossed their path in the line of duty.

Professors Ejitawn and Obuoforibo were honourable and dependable men, who were trusted, looked up to and followed. As Edward Stanton muttered after Abraham Lincoln's demise, "Now he belongs to the ages". These honest, devoted and extremely capable scholars and administrators truly belong to the historical milieu of the University of Port Harcourt.

Ejituwu taught me Introduction to World History in this University with the zeal of a Medieval Crusader and a Pentecostal Preacher put

together! This attitude of total commitment to work was expressed in his Secondary School logo 'labor est voluptas', meaning 'labour is pleasure'. After a chequered educational career in Ikuru Town, Andoni and Duke Town Presbyterian Secondary School, Calabar between 1954 and 1959, Professor Ejituwu was sufficiently equipped with a good basic education to proceed to Yankton College, South Dakota and University of Wisconsin, Madison, United States, from where he obtained his Bachelor's and Master's Degrees in History and English in 1969 and 1971, respectively. He took up teaching appointment with the University of Lagos in 1975. This astute scholar returned home to put an icing on his impressive academic career when he was conferred with the Doctor of Philosophy Degree in History from the University of Lagos in 1977.

Ejituwu's area of specialization were American and Niger Delta History, being a protégée of three famous historians: Professors Philip Curtin of Wisconsin University, Ebiegberi Alagoa of University of Port Harcourt and Ade Ajayi of University of Lagos, No wonder, he was conferred with the prestigious Fellowship of the Historical Society of Nigeria (HSN) in 2006. He was instrumental to the training of many of the younger historians who are propagating the subject in the University system today. He joined the services of the University of Port Harcourt in 1979, where he took serious interest in Niger Delta Studies, contributing over 30 articles to national and international scholarly journals and 12 chapter in books, including four books. From the position of Lecturer I in 1979, Ejituwu meteorically rose through the ranks to become Professor in 1994. He was Head, Department of History between 1986 and 1995 and Director, College of Continuing Education between 1998 and 2002.

Professor Ejituwu served on the National Universities Commission (NUC) Accreditation Committees to several Nigerian universities and External Examiner too. He was Assistant Secretary of the African Studies Association of Nigeria and Consulting Editor to many historical journals. Like his great teacher, Professor Alagoa, Ejituwu was a

strong believer in combining evidence from oral sources such as Archaeology, Anthropology, Linguistics and Ethnography with written records to build his case for Historiography as a credible means of studying African History. He was also a pioneer in foregrounding the role of women in the historical progression of society.

He served as Commissioner and later Chairman of the Rivers State Civil Service Commission between 1979 and

1984 and Member of the Governing Council of the Rivers State University of Science and Technology between 1992 and 1994. He was also Chairman of the Governing Council of Rivers State College of Education (now Ignatius Ajuru University of Education) and Member. Rivers State Economic Advisory Council between 2009 and 2011. Ejituwu retired from the services of the University in 2005 and completed a five-year Contract appointment in November, 2010. He died on Tuesday, 20 December, 2011 following a brief illness at the

Obuoforibo was Provost between 1980 and 1986. He was thus, an Anatomist, Provost and Chief Medical Director of University of Port Harcourt Teaching Hospital. Under his leadership, the College of Health Sciences established a unique Bachelor of Medical Science programme that resulted in proper coordination of the Basic Medical Sciences to allow better clinical orientation among Medical students. It is to the eternal credit of Professor Obuoforibo that the young Medical School was able to prepare and graduate its first batch of Doctors on schedule, while still meeting the stringent conditions set by the Medical and Dental Council of Nigeria (MDCAN). It is also on record that Obuoforibo joined forces with the second Vice-Chancellor, Professor Sylvanus Cookey, to establish the University of Port Harcourt Teaching Hospital against entrenched interest groups that were bent on sending the pioneer medical class to an established hospital for clinical training outside Rivers State. An accomplished scholar without boundaries or limitation

An accomplished scholar without boundaries or limitation in his area of expertise, Professor Obuoforibo was invited by the WHO as a Consultant to the Government of Uganda in manpower development for the health sector between 1991 and 1997. He concurrently served as Visiting Professor at Makerere University, where he played a major role in designing a competency-based curriculum in Medicine. Between 1998 and 2004, Professor Obuoforibo was at the Mid-West University, Glendale, Arizona and Morehouse School of Medicine Atlanta. At Morchouse, he participated in the introduction of the Master of Science and Clinical Research to general applause. He was also a knight in the Anglicon Communion and a member of the Rivers State Economic Advisory Council.

For his many pioneering roles in medical education and university administration. Obuoforibo was cited and decorated as a Distinguished Professor at the second

edition of the award under the auspices of the National Universities Commission (NUC). His numerous Awards for distinguished service span the entire length and breadth of the world. On each occasion, he would mount the garlanded podium with accustomed calmness and focused ambience that betrayed his great erudition and philosophical disposition. He was usually not moved by all the manufactured adulations that are heaped on men of fleeting achievements to flatter their little egos. He was a man bent on doing good in his chosen profession and the larger society. Obuoforibo did not believe in awards in anticipation of performance which is now in vogue in Nigeria.

Professor Obuoforibo was a great and innovative pioneer in diverse areas of medical education and practice for many years. In a Tribute, the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, described the fallen academic giant as a man who had a special gift for introducing new concepts and ideas which he usually pursued to the point of realization—attributes that were saluted and celebrated by those who crossed his path. Professor Abiye Obuoforibo left his unmistakable intellectual DNA

They will be certainly missed by all of us. Their stories are the stuff of which legends and their legacies are made. "Life levels all men: death reveals the eminent", says Wilfred Sheed. Adieu! Great academic generals!

On his part, Professor Abive Obuoforibo, was among the pioneer Medical Class of University of Lagos in 1962 from where he obtained the Bachelor Medicine/Bachelor of Surgery Degree. He joined the Department of Anatomy as Demonstrator in 1968. This crudite Medical Practitioner and Educator obtained a Fellowship from the World Health Organization (WHO) that took

h i m to the University of Sheffield for his Doctoral Degree in Human Biology and Instructional Technology. He completed his studies in December, 1972 and returned to the University of Lagos. In 1974, Professor Obuoforibo was invited to play a pioneering role in the establishment of the Department of Anatomy, University of Benin, an assignment he successfully accomplished, following which he was elevated to the rank of Professor of Anatomy four years later.

Obuoforibo joined the services of the University of Port Harcourt in 1981 as a Professor of Anatomy and became Provost, College of Health Sciences within a few months of his arrival following the appointment of the incumbent, Professor Francis Theodore Ogiriki as Vice-Chancellor of the emergent Federal University of Technology, Ado Ekiti.

#### INDIA PLANS TO BOOST SOCIAL SCIENCE RESEARCH ...

n a bid to rejuvenate social science research, India has announced several measures targeted at the Indian Council of Social Science Research (ICSSR). They include establishing a Social Sciences Knowledge and Research Network, a National Social Science Research Innovation Centre and a fellowship scheme to attract young scholars into social sciences

The government will also institute 10 annual Amartya Sen awards for advancement of knowledge in the social sciences. The ICSSR is the central government institution that looks after funding of social sciences research in the country.

The initiatives followed a report last June by a review committee set up by the government, which found that social science research in India was suffering severely from lack of funding, recognition and initiative. Addressing an international conference on "Indian Social Sciences in a Changing World: Roles, responsibilities and reforms" in New Delhi last week, Education Minister Kapil Sibal announced that the ICSSR would develop a fellowship scheme to encourage young scholars interested in pursuing social science research.

### CCE Holds W'Shop On Open Distance Learning

ollege of Continuing Education (CCE) held a sensitization Workshop last Monday for Principal Officers, Deans of Faculty and major stakeholders that would participate in the proposed Open Distance Learning (ODL) programme at the newly-acquired CCE facility along Sani Abacha Road, GRA, Port Harcourt.

In his welcome remark, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, described the proposed ODL for the University as a clear transformational step aimed at addressing emerging trends in knowledge transfer. Professor Ajienka, who was represented by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic), Professor Bernard Efiuwwevwere, commended the Acting Director, Open Distance Learning of the National Universities Commission (NUC), Dr Ramon Yusuf, for his untiring effort towards realization of the project that has a potential to benefit a large clientele.

The Vice-Chancellor, who expressed hope that the University would do its best to sustain the programme when it finally commences, charged Lecturers in the affected Faculties to be fully committed to its smooth take-off, advising all those involved to take the bold step to overcome possible challenges that may be associated with such a pioneering effort.

Acting Director, ODL, NUC, Dr Yusuf advised that the Open Distance Learning system should not be seen as an afterthought to access higher education, but an emerging digital opportunity that would enhance teaching and learning, if properly explored, adding that the online study system has the potential of saving cost for both students and Lectures.

Dr Yusuf urged every stakeholder in the ODL to grow out of *technophobia* as the ICT-enabled learning is a fast and efficient method of learning, stressing that in the next phase of assessment, the NUC would ensure that basic materials needed to facilitate teaching and learning are on ground before the commencement of the programme in any other location.

Earlier in his remark, Director, CCE, Professor Steve Okodudu, reiterated that it would no longer be business as usual, as the College was now well-positioned to strike a balance between creating access to education and

awarding degrees to only deserving students, disclosing that technological knowledge would be key to gaining admission into the College henceforth.

Officials of Schulportals Technologies, an information technology consulting firm facilitated the advocacy training through joint PowerPoint presentation for officers of the University. The officials who included Julius Momoh (CEO), Soji Adewunmi (Head, Training & Implementation) and Siji Akinbola (Head, Media & Implementation) disclosed that they collaborate with NUC to train Tutors and license institutions for Open Distance Learning.
