

Elaborating on the significance of Emeritus Professor status, Professor Ajienka stated that, "Where there are elders grey with wisdom and rich in experiencing we expect leadership and guidance. We expect mentorship of the young academics. Emeriti Professors are academic iroko

trees beneath whom young academics will continue to shelter and be mentored to maturity in their own rights. The Vice-Chancellor, who enumerated the contributions of the new Emeriti Professors to the growth of the University, said that it was the administration of Professor Nimi Briggs as Vice-Chancellor that kick-started construction of the Senate Building, built the sports facilities which launched the University as a centre of excellence in sports, leading to its uninterrupted emergence as champions of Nigeria Universities Games Association (NUGA) and West Africa University Games (WAUG), attracted the PTDF Chair in Gas Engineering, PTDF Gas Engineering Building and ETF (now TETfund) Gas Engineering Building. Briggs is a Professor of Obstetrics and Gynaecology.

In extolling the qualities of Emeritus Professor Anosike, the Vice-Chancellor, pointed out that the retired Professor of Biochemistry showed sound leadership by building an exemplary Department. "In the Department of Biochemistry, he raised a closely-knit research team that worked as a family and have grown together in harmony ever since his arrival here. Biochemistry is one exemplary Department where they teach courses and supervise Theses and Dissertations in teams headed by very senior academics," he said.

For Emeritus Professor Nduka, his achievements also spans through academic and administrative inputs with his initiation of many academic programmes including

the Sandwich programme, while serving as pioneer Dean, Faculty of Education. His groundbreaking seminal book in 1964 titled: Western Education and the Nigerian Cultural Background is seen as a revolutionary book coming at a time the country was emerging from colonial rule.

"He retired in 1991 after a glorious career that produced the next crop of academics in the emergent Faculty. In 2006. Professor Nduka threw another hombshell in the academic space with the publication of his book of essays titled: The Roots of African Underdevelopment and Other Essays, "the Vice-Chancellor added.

"Professor Okiwelu was the unofficial President of Senate of the University for many years. He was the foremost Senior Advocate on the floor of Senate in the mould of Chief Rotimi Williams of blessed memory popularly called Timi the Law. Professor Okiwelu served the University in various capacities during his active academic and administrative career that spanned over three decades," Professor Ajienka disclosed.

A retired Professor in the Department of Animal & Environmental Biology, Faculty of Science, Okiwelu was said to have contributed immensely to the growth of the Chairman, University Strategic Plan Committee that developed the Ten-Year (2003-2013) Plan, titled: Building the Future.

Reading the Guidelines for Conferment of Emeritus Professor Status on Retired Professors, Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic), Professor Andrew Joe, stated that the beneficiary shall have duly retired from the services of the University at the appropriate retirement age and not on contract appointment at the time of nomination, served as Professor for a period of, at least, 15 years, 10 of which must have been spent in the University in active service, must not be found guilty by a Court or Panel of Inquiry of competent jurisdiction among other requirements.

Speaking on behalf of other recipients, former Vice-Chancellor, Emeritus Professor Briggs thanked the University for the honour, recalling that it was the University of Ibadan that first started the recognition in Nigerian universities with the appointment of Late Victor Oyenuga as an Emeritus Professor IN 1979.

"Seen as a mark of recognition, universities reserve this honour for those who, as it were, have become bedfellows with them; those they cannot let go and those who cannot let the university go. We will be alive to our responsibility, the Almighty God giving us strength and good health and we will at all times, strive to do our utmost best to place this University among the best in the world," Emeritus Professor Briggs summarized.



Taming Traffic Gridlock On E'West Rd

Despite vigorous efforts made by Management and Traffic Wardens in the University to ensure free flow of vehicles on Campus, it has become a distressing daily experience for commuters in the University of Port Harcourt and its environs, writes MERCY DON-BARIDAM.

Reviewing the traffic problem within the University community, it is obvious that getting into the University premises on daily basis has become a great challenge for staff and students.

Simeon Onyiroro, who is a staff of the Security Unit, described the traffic situation as an unpleasant daily experience, noting that traffic jam is on the increase, suggesting ways to unlock the prevalent gridlock, especially on the busy Choba Junction of the East/West Road.

Simeon disclosed that as part of efforts aimed at improving the traffic situation, TIMARIV, the Rivers State Government-owned Traffic Management Agency, has deployed its personnel to the East-West Road. He expressed satisfaction, that since the new Chief Security Officer, Lt. Col. Reginald Isiguzo (Rtd) took office, illegal parking by commercial motorcycle operators has drastically reduced.

Lamenting the dearth of personnel, Onyiroro recommended that the only way the traffic situation can improve is for Management of the University to employ more hands in the unit, "When we started, we were about ten in number and usually ran shifts; we also did posting at the University Park Gate and the junction, as time went on some retired and since then, there has been no replacement to fill this gap", he said, appealing to Management to recruit more able-bodied personnel to the Traffic Unit.

According to him, traffic from the Choba East-West road axis has worsened, listing illegal motorbike operators and bus parking, bad roads, trading as some of the major causes of traffic gridlock in the area, even as he acknowledged the palliative effort by Homan Engineering on the NTA/Choba axis of the road which seems to have eased the situation a hit.

Onyiroro appealed to Management to relocate the Park currently situated near the Aluu Drive Gate as a means of controlling traffic, calling on Government to assist the University fix the roads and construct an overhead bridge to make the road motorable as a lasting solution to the problem.

Alumni Lecture

Excellence Key To Effective Leadership ~*Prof Wariboko*

a Nigerians continue to grapple with bad leadership almost three decades after renowned novelist, Professor Chinua Achebe, identified it as the nation's major problem in his seminal essay, The Trouble with Nigeria, notable Alumnus of the University, Professor Nimi Wariboko, has prescribed excellence as panacea for leadership challenges in the country.

Wariboko made the assertion in a Lecture, titled "Leadership and Governance" during the Alumni Homecoming of the University of Port Harcourt as part of activities preceding the 28" Convocation, at Ebitimi Banigo Auditorium, penultimate Friday.

The Lecturer, who is a 1984 First Class Graduate of Economics, lamented that "Nigerian edites are lost in corruption, lost in the world; they have lost their path to excellence. Elitism is darkness in Nigeria. Leaders need to turn around to find the orientation to the greatness of the black race, to see where the sun is rising."

Defining excellence as "the actualization of the potentialities of all citizens so each and every one can be all that he or she can be," Wariboko pointed out that a leader's concern is to create the ethos, change the orientation of the system or polity so that every human being will have the opportunity to actualize to the highest possible level of his or her potentialities.

According to him, a leader must ensure that each person born into the country dies empty; dies after having blessed his or her generation with all the gifts that God deposited in him or her. "President Barack Obama is not the first black person capable of being the President of the United States. For over three hundred years, the ethos of the United States of America did not allow the potential of any black man or woman to lead at the highest political level to be actualized.

Wariboko, whose Lecture was delivered by Dr Eme Ekekwe of the Department of Political and Administrative Studies, observed that "a leadership that does not allow participation of its citizens in the development and furtherance of their gifts and capabilities and in doing so contribute to the wellbeing of their community is one that cannot claim to bridge leadership and governance. The command structures, norms, and practices make no sense if it fails in this one supreme duty.

"For Nigerian leaders to refuse the capabilities, training, and socio-economic environment that will enable the citizens to actualize their creative potentials is sheer callousness and wickedness of the highest depravity," he noted.

Also speaking, distinguished Alumnus and President of Federal Republic of Nigeria, Dr Goodluck Jonathan, expressed delight to be invited to participate in the A I u m n i Homecoming of members of

all stakeholders in the education system to tackle them. We must play our roles in ensuring that our university and other universities in Nigeria attain world-class status through the relevant of the relevant

She said that an educated citizenry and a competent workforce are necessary in order to strengthen Nigeria's young democracy.

"Alumni Associations are critical stakeholders. We must realize that it is our responsibility to ensure that those who graduate from our universities after us are better equipped than we were; they should be more competitive in the global knowledge economy. We, as Alumni of Unique UNIPORT, should have a critical role to play. We are the bridge between the past, the present and the future," the President said.

In his address, another Alumnus and Governor of Rivers State, Rt Hon Chibuike Amacchi, who spoke through the Permanent Secretary, Rivers State Ministry of Education, Richard Ofurum, reaffirmed his resolve to build the Elechi Amadi Faculty of Humanities promised earlier. He announced plans to build a model secondary school in the University, in addition to the model primary school which is onegoing, stating that by the next Homecoming of the Association, the primary school shall have been completed.

According to him, the University would be 40 in three years' time, urging members of the Alumni Association to contribute towards the development of their Alma Mater, such as endowing Chairs, building of hostels and classroom, among other forms of donation.

Earlier in his speech, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, observed that "since it was established 37 years ago, the University of Port Harcourt, has recorded glant strides that we are very proud of. The University has made tremendous achievements in infrastructural development, including some groundbreaking researches that have received commendation both at home and abroad.

"I am pleased to announce that the University has produced over 50, 000 graduates since its inception. This distinguished crop of Alumni shares a common bond of friendship that has endured. It is gratifying to note that many have had very exciting careers in diverse fields of human endeavour. Among them are university administrators, doctors, lawyers, commissioners, legislators, clergymen, amongst others, Professor Ajienka pointed out, adding that despite their excellent careers, they have remained close to their Alma Mater.

He cited President Goodluck Jonathan, Governor Chibuike Amaechi and Chief Nyesom Wike, Minister of State for Education, calling on other Alumni to emulate the benevolence of the aforementioned Alumni.

Also speaking. Chairman of Rivers State branch of the Association, Mr Sampson Ngregbara, said that the Alumni Homecoming was conceived to draw attention to the need for greater commitment, noting that "the world over, universities are being driven by their Alumni Associations. Ours cannot be different."

He added that although some members of the Association have made remarkable contribution to the University on individual basis, it is necessary for members of the Association to come together and contribute towards the building of an Alumni Centre, which would

house the University Exams and ds Office as well as the Alumni retariat.

In his contribution. Chairman of the occasion. Dr Alex Otti, who spoke through the Vice President of the Nigerian Labour Congress (NLC) Aremu, stressed the need to sustain the Homecoming, regretting that the Education For All by the year 2000 campaign of the 1990s was not achieved, yet the new Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) 2015 target is close by with nothing on ground to suggest that the goals are attainable. The highlight of the event was fundraising for the Alumni Centre.

FURORE OVER MOVE TO STEM MEDICAL BRAIN DRAIN In India by Alya Mishra

n a bid to curb a major brain drain of valuable medical personnel, India has said that doctors leaving for higher medical studies in America will have to sign a government bond promising to return after their courses - a move that has caused consternation among medical students and doctors.

The American government has always required certificates from the Indian Health Ministry to issue a visa to Indian doctors going to US medical schools.

In the past, Indian students had to provide a written assurance to the Ministry that they would return back to their country to practise after completing medical studies abroad. But now the government wants students to sign a legally enforceable affidavit to return to India.

"If a student does not come back from the US, he won't be allowed to practise there," Health Minister, Ghulam Nabi Azad said on 23 April.

In the past three years, 3,000 Indian doctors have gone abroad for studies

authorities require a government No Objection Certificate, or NOC, for every Indian student enrolling with an American institution from this academic session, which gives the Indian government some leverage to attempt to stem the brain drain.

Azad said: "No other country except the US is asking for this

NOC. Those who apply to go to the US for studies from 2012 will have to give us a bond saying they will come back after finishing the studies. If they don't fulfil the bond obligation, we can write to the US to deny the student permission to practise."

But the statement led to criticism from the medical community, which argued the move would not stop the brain drain but simply redirect it to countries other than the US.

Others support the government's bid to keep top medical talent in the country, where it is greatly needed.

"If the government is setting such a condition it is because it is investing heavily in medical education of these doctors and providing highly subsidised education," said Dr Tatyarao Lahane, Dean of JJ Hospital and the Grant Medical College in Mumbai.
